



Haileybury People Change Minds in Federal Election

-Vote Reversed From That of Previous Week Gives Walter Little Majority

Perhaps the most interesting part of the Federal election on Monday, so far as Haileybury is concerned, was the way in which local voters reversed their ideas of the two old parties during the week that intervened following the provincial contest the previous Monday. From a substantial Progressive Conservative majority for R. D. Cumming on June 4 they changed around and voted Liberal on June 11, giving Walter Little, M.P., a considerable lead over F. H. Todd, the Conservative candidate. Figures in the provincial election gave Cumming 462, Nixon 217, Taylor 195 and Lewis 10, while the standing this time was: Little 485, Todd 311, Ames 149 and Teeple 13.

While up to yesterday returns for the riding were not complete according to figures compiled by Returning Officer H. Clifford Walter Little's election seems to be assured. There were only a few scattered polls to be heard from and it was not considered likely that the overseas vote, still to come, could make any material change in the standing of the four candidates. The C.C.F. candidate C. C. Ames, was in second place with a good lead over the vote polled by F. H. Todd, Progressive Conservative, while the Labor Progressive, FO Garth Teeple was not at any time a likely winner, and was trailing away behind the others when the votes were counted.

The latest returns gave Little 7,020 votes, Ames 5,253, Todd 3,735 and Teeple 523. Returns came in fairly rapidly during the evening, with some 123 polls of the 139 in the riding reporting before 10 o'clock. Early in the evening it was evident from reports reaching the committee rooms of the two old parties that the King Government would be returned to power. Nothing in the way of a celebration took place here and most of the local people stayed in their homes and received the reports by radio.

STOLE FISHING TACKLE AFTER BREAK-IN AT HARDWARE STORE HERE

A thief or thieves with a penchant for the sport of angling got fishing tackle with an estimated value of \$40 in a burglary which occurred at the store of the Haileybury Hardware Co. over the past week-end. Entrance to the building was made by the cellar window and by using an axe on the door at the head of the stairs leading to the store and the break-in was not discovered until a clerk arrived to open up on Monday morning. In addition to the fishing tackle a few small batteries were missed and the cash register had been opened, but only a few coppers had been left in it on Saturday night. Chief K. R. Watson and constable A. Souliere of the provincial police investigated the burglary, but they said there was little in the way of clues, although there were some fingerprints left. The thieves left the building by the rear door, and there were some traces of an attempt to open it from the outside.

New Ore Indicator Being Tried Out in Temagami Area

Invention of New York Men Locates Veins and Ore Through Overburden

A new "electronic ore indicator," the invention of two New York men interested in mining, is being tried out on a group of claims in Cassells and Strathy townships, in the Temagami Forest Reserve, according to information given The Haileyburian on Saturday by local mining men holding interests in the recently formed Hermet Mines Limited. This company has secured several claims located in the townships named and has also a large group located on the south band of sediments in McElroy township, Larder Lake area. At present there is a drill crew working on the Cassells township group where fair values have been secured from prospecting, and it is the intention to further develop the other properties.

Property Sales By Town Council Still Principal Business

Six Houses Disposed of at Tuesday Night Session and Some Offers Are Pending

This report of the regular meeting of the town council, held on Tuesday night, might well be headed "Continued From Last Month," as the greater part of the four-hour session was taken up with sales of property owned by the municipality. In all, six houses were sold, together with a couple of vacant lots, and the total receipts reached the sum of \$4,950. Two of the houses were sold to tenants who have rented them for a considerable period, and these deals brought up the question of other properties which belong to the town and are rented, in some cases by the former owners who had failed to keep up their housing payments and the properties had been repossessed. It was pointed out that last month two houses had been sold to tenants, two more were sold at the Tuesday meeting and enquiries made at the town office indicated that there were other prospective purchasers who might be interested in some of the houses which are rented now.

In the sales made at the meeting, all of which were for cash and subject to approval by the Department of Municipal Affairs, Emile Marcoux bought two houses, one on Russell street for \$600 and the other on Blackwell street for which he will pay \$1000. Both will be repaired and renovated this summer. Ian D. MacDiarmid got the old Carr house on Probyn for \$300 and an undertaking to spend a considerable sum in rebuilding; Geo. Beaudet bought the Browning street house in which he is living for \$1000, and A. H. Swanson, who occupies a house on Latchford street, will pay \$1800 for it and three lots. In addition two vacant lots on Silver street were sold to Daniel Proulx for \$50 and an old house on the Lake Shore road went to Emil Boyer for \$200. He will remove the building and plans to erect a bungalow from the material on property he owns on Amwell street.

Legal Battle Over Cobalt Property Again Postponed

Supit by George Mitchell Subject of Argument in Supreme Court This Week

The protracted legal battle between the town of Cobalt and George Mitchell, K.C., over property in the municipality owned by the lawyer, it is stated, and sold for taxes by the corporation, furnished another skirmish at the non-jury sittings of the Supreme Court in Haileybury on Tuesday the result being an order by Mr. Justice Keiller Mackay setting the case over until next fall. In granting this request by the Kirkland Lake lawyer, His Lordship made the hearing peremptory then, and said that the "costs thrown away" are to be paid by the plaintiff to the municipality within thirty days.

J. A. Legris, K.C., appearing for the town of Cobalt, had asked for costs of the day, and that these should be paid within a limited time. He had brought one witness from Noranda and another from Cobalt, Mr. Legris said. The judge said the costs thrown away should be paid by the plaintiff, including witness fees.

Mr. Mitchell had protested it was "beyond all reason" to bring on the action at this court, following the decision of the Court of Appeal, rendered last month. Mr. Justice Mackay said there would be no further enlargements and he would make the order for next fall peremptory, Mr. Legris observing at this juncture that "with all due respect to your Lordship, he (Mr Mitchell) will have another excuse then."

Opening his argument, Mr. Mitchell said the case had come before Mr. Justice Plaxton, and was over a tax sale of his property in 1943. One ground of the action was that no warrant had been issued to the treasurer of the municipality, and Mr. Mitchell Mr. Justice Plaxton set aside the sale on that ground, but that his judgment had been reversed by the Court of Appeal.

Other actions on the list included eleven divorce actions and a case involving property in Kirkland Lake. His Lordship proceeded with the first divorce cases on the list after the Mitchell and Cobalt argument had been ended by the ruling of the bench, and two of the three plaintiffs first heard had served with the RCAF, one of them overseas and the other in Toronto. Both got decrees nisi from their wives, while in an action in which the wife had entered a counter-action it was stated by plaintiff's solicitor that notice of discontinuance of her proceedings had been filed by her solicitor.

STRAY LOGS CLEARED FROM LOCAL AIRPORT BY TIMBER FIRMS

Two timber firms, the Canadian Splint and Lumber Company and the Upper Ottawa Improvement Company, operating on Lake Temiskaming, cleared all the stray logs from the Haileybury airport over the week-end. The floating timber had become a menace to planes using the port and was the subject of complaints last week, when the matter was taken up with Walter Little, M. P., who notified the Department of Public Works at Ottawa. An engineer of the department visited the area and later the two companies did some "sweeping" of the lake, removing the logs. The exceptionally high water enabled the crew of the steamer Wabis of the Ottawa company to bring the boat right into the northwest corner of the airport at one stage of the operations where during the summer there is a dry beach. There has been a drop of a few feet in the lake level during the past week, and it appears as though it will soon be back to normal for the time of year.

A full platoon of Chinese soldiers, most of them Canadian born, have just finished basic training in Canada for the fight against Japan.

NEW LISKEARD LADY ALSO SEES UNUSUAL BIRDS THIS SUMMER

Sequel to a note in the last issue of The Haileyburian, to the effect that H. G. Pickard had observed an American redstart in this district, a New Liskeard woman who told the reporter she would prefer to remain anonymous, said these birds were quite common around North Bay and Callander. She said also that, in her own observation this summer, she had come across specimens of both the Morning Warbler and Pine Warbler, the former recognizable by its blue cowl. Both birds, which are new this year to her, the informant said were rather unusual in this part of Northern Ontario. Both varieties of warbler were attracted to honeysuckle, the reporter was informed.

German Prisoner Found on Highway By Dept. Official

Made No Objection When Taken to Police Headquarters by Surveyor

Clad in the distinctive uniform worn by enemy prisoners-of-war held in Canada, a German seaman captured by the Allies on the Atlantic four years ago, it is stated, was hailed as he walked along No. 11 highway south of the Latchford bridge the other morning and, after some questioning by G. W. Fowler of the Department of Highways, was taken by the latter in his car to Haileybury and turned over to the Ontario provincial police.

Officers of that force stationed at district headquarters had no word at that time of any prisoner being missing, and apparently this man had left a job he and others from the Monteith internment camp are doing for the T. & N. O. Johnson. Mr. Fowler said he was at his car, which had been parked on the road while he was carrying out survey operations, when he saw the man approaching along the main highway, the big red patch on the back of his upper clothing and red stripes proclaiming his status.

The man, Mr. Fowler said, requested a cigarette and when asked where he was going in the clothes he was wearing, said he wanted to get some civilian attire. Some further conversation followed, and finally Mr. Fowler said he told the German he would take him to the police, the prisoner offering no objection. The Nazi then was put in the car and the trip to Haileybury made, with a stop in Cobalt for gasoline. The German made no effort to escape it was stated.

Mr. Fowler said the German who had been in the Nazi merchant marine service, spoke good English at times, but on occasion became less intelligible. He was questioned later by Inspector S. Oliver of the provincial police, it was stated, and held for return to camp. According to information here, a number of prisoners in charge of six unarmed guards are at Johnson as a work gang for the railway, but he was several miles from the siding there that was their headquarters when Mr. Fowler met him. One report said the man had been under observation while at Monteith.

Haileybury Soldier Spotted Enemy's Counter Attack

Wilfrid Allard Figures in Maple Leaf News as Final Action Described

"The enemy were within 500 yards of Tac HQ when first spotted by Pte. W. J. Allard of Haileybury, Ont.," reads, in part, a news item by a staff writer of The Maple Leaf, and appearing in a recent issue of that publication. "This group had infiltrated through the widely spread companies of the Camerons and were a very determined looking lot. The headquarters was in the suburbs of Kirchhatten," the article continues; "Allard gave the alarm and everyone in the room—there were members of the Scout platoon, drivers and sigs—immediately swung into action."

The Pte. Allard mentioned is Wilfrid Allard, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Allard of Haileybury and one of three brothers serving overseas at present. He has been with the Queen's Own Cameron Rifles of Winnipeg, and the story quoted states this was the last major action for the unit. It was a "Jerry counter-attack late in the afternoon of April 23," and it will "long be remembered by most of the men at Tac HQ," for "bitter fighting was required to convince the stubborn enemy it was no dice."

The news story states also that in the fight "our shotsmen were a little too accurate for them and after suffering heavy casualties they retired." The article relates also how one man was frying eggs at the time the attack was made and "I saw that the situation was under control, so I just kept on with my job." There is a note also on how the unit observed V-E Day with suitable ceremonial, in which comrades who had lost their lives were not forgotten.

Pte. Wilfrid Allard has been four years overseas, The Haileyburian was told, and it is expected he may be home in the course of the next month, about which time another member of the family Corp. Edward Allard of the RCAF may be back. He enlisted in July of 1942, and was in Germany at last reports, with one letter written home while he was on leave in Paris. The third brother in uniform is Pte. Lawrence Allard, with the Algonquins in Germany.
