Record Broken in April Rains But Winter Lingers

Weather Summary From Local Station Shows Month Was Unusual

How winter "lingered in the lap of spring" this year is shown vividly in the monthly summary of weather conditions during April, prepared at the Haileybury meteorological station by Jas. Keavell for the district newspapers.

The average temperature for the month was 30.6 degrees, nearly seven degrees below the average of the previous April, which was 37.2 degrees. Over the period since 1894 when station was established the average is 35.8 degrees.

The highest temperature last month came on the 29th, at 59.2 degrees, while the low point was on the 19th, with 8.6 degrees. Corresponding figures for April, 1946, were 69.8, on the 22nd, and 16.0 on the 10th.

On two occasions in the past, 1919 and 1921, there has been an April day when the mercury reached 87 degrees, while the cold record was set in 1919, at seven degrees below zero. The greatest range in temperature last month came on the 29th, with 37.2 degrees, while the steadiest day was the 11th, when a variation of only 3.6 degrees was recorded.

One record was broken by April this year. There was rainfall of 4.18 inches measured at the station. Last year saw only .99 of an inch, and the averages over the long period is 142 inches. While the snow was heavy, the total of 11.6 inches is well below the same month last year, when 14.2 inches fell during the 30 days. The average April has had 7.6 inches.

However, the past winter has seen plenty of snow, 145.2 inches to be exact, according to the records. Starting with a "trace" in October, the following month-by-month summary has been appended to Mr. Reavell's report: No-

ember 14.4 inches; December 32.2; January 24.1; February 23.1 March 39.8, and April 11.6.

Winds in April were lighter this year than in 1946. A total of 3,672 miles was recorded, with an average velocity of 5.11 miles per hour, compared to 5,355 and 7,433 respectively for previous April. The highest wind of the month blew at the rate of 20 miles per hour, from the north; the prevailing winds were also from that direction accounting for 1,031 miles in 136 hours, and at one period the north wind blew continuously for 32 hours, registering 282 miles. There were 105 calm hours during the month, compared to 74 last year.

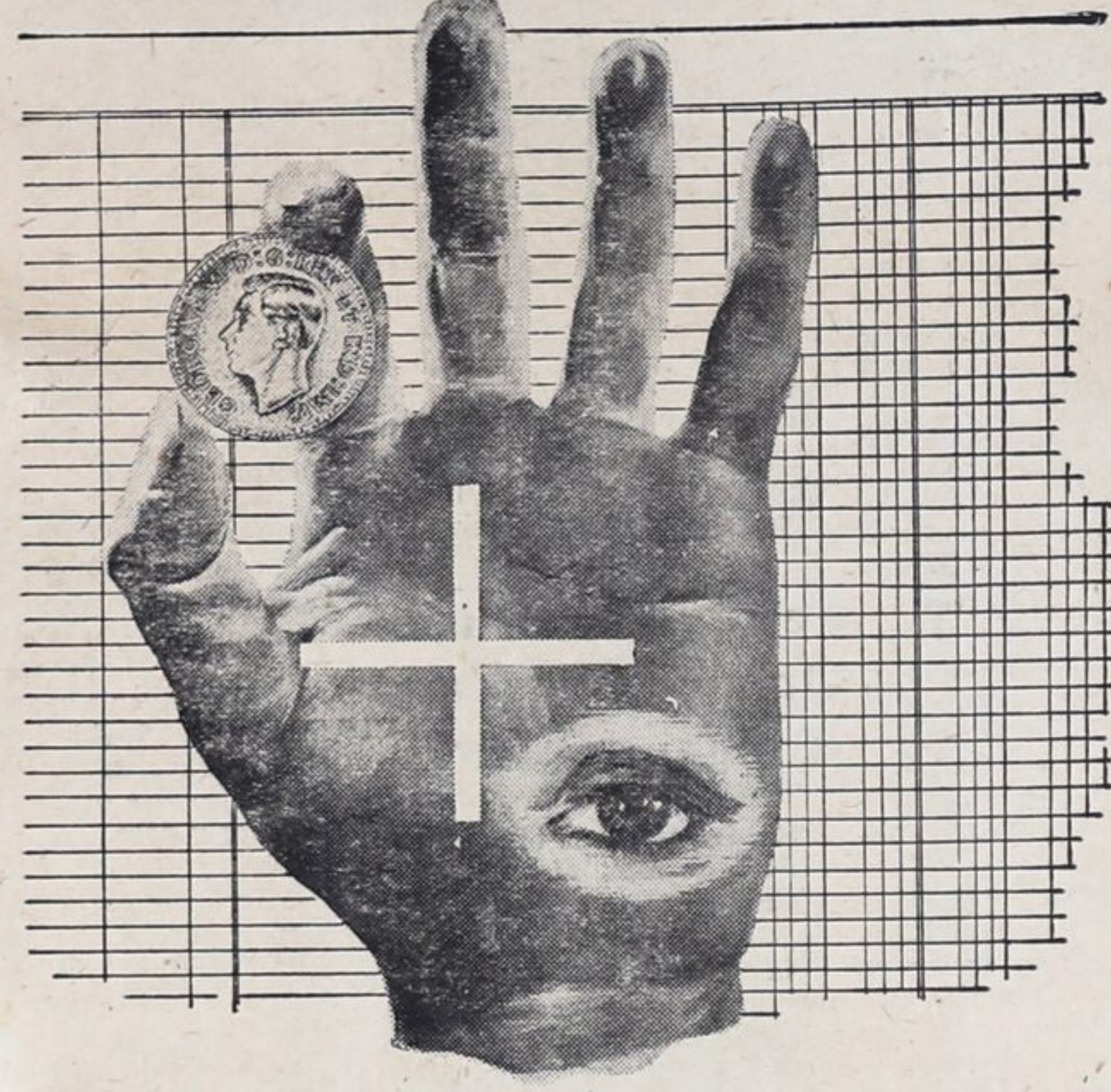
