**May Temperature Above Average Summary Shows**

**Daily Mean Recorded at 53.5 Degrees; Rainfall Less Than Half Normal**

In these days of uncertainties the only things you can count on are your fingers.

The month of May this year was a bit warmer than the average in this district, according to the summary prepared by Jas.

Jas. Reavell at the Haileybury meteorological station. The average daily mean temperature stood at 53.5 degrees, or nearly three degrees higher than normal since the station was established in 1894, which is given in the summary as 50.7 degrees. Average for May of last year was 50.9 degrees.

The warmest day last month was recorded at 86 degrees, on the 26th; the minimum of 24.6 degrees was reached on the 13th. Last year, the figures were

and 22.4 respectively. May of 1896 holds the record for a hot day, at 92.7 degrees, while in 1903 the cold record was reached, 13.5 degrees. The maximum range in temperature last month came on the 1st, 41.6 degrees, while the minimum was on the 9th, only 8.2 degrees, according to Mr. Reavell's summary.

Rainfall for month was only 1.01 inches, higher than the May fall of .44 of an inch last year, but well below the average, which stands at 2.52 inches. There was

just a trace of snow during the month, although the average May has a fall of .8 of an inch, and last year there was fall of 3.3 inches. Wind records at the station show a total of 4,774 miles recorded for the month, with an average velocity of 6.4 miles per hour. Last year's figures were 4,829 and 6.9 respectively. The highest wind last month blew from the southwest, on the 10th, at 20 miles per hour, and there were just 24 calm hours.

**ENROLLMENT STANDARDS:**

To enlist you must:

1. Volunteer to serve anywhere.
2. Be a Canadian citizen or other British subject.
3. Be 17 to 40 (Tradesmen to 45).
4. Meet Army requirements.
5. Married men will be accepted.

**TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT:**

You will be enrolled in the Canadian Army Active Force for a period of three years.

All men are eligible for Overseas Service. If the military situation permits, married men after one year's Service Overseas, single men after two years' Service Overseas, may request discharge even if they have not completed full three years' service.

**CONDITIONS OF SERVICE:**

Current rates of pay and allowances. Serve for 3 years or make it a career.

**VETERANS' BENEFITS:**

Reinstatement in civil employment, Unemployment Insurance and other appropriate benefits under Veterans' Charter as extended by Parliament.

**MEN:**

Retention of present Reserve Force rank or the rank held in Second World War, subject to proving qualifications in service within a 90-day period.

**OFFICERS:**

Short Service Commissions will be granted to officers who do not wish to enroll in the Active Force on a Career basis. Further information should be obtained from your own unit or the nearest Army Personnel Depot.
