Internation **Nickel Option**

Lands Northwest of Town Prove Quite Intriguing to Big Nickel Corporation

The Toronto papers have been carrying stories about the International Nickel Company signing up options on farm lands in the immediate Haileybury district and it is said that fairly important money has changed hands so far.

During the past few months Inco has used two airborne magnetometers to carry out a fairly extensive survey over a wide sec-

For years now it has been general knowledge that small quantiwith the silver-cobalt ores in the Cobalt camp, situated some four Mr. Lewis' investigation fol- to five miles southwest of Hailnickel associated with cobalt at its own property. So far, this particular company has not been able to realize a commercial return from the limited 11/2 to 2 per cent nickel content in the ore as the material has been lost in the cobalt concentrates.

It s reported that one of these farms on which an option has been taken by Inco is that of Foster Rice, manager of the Producer's Co-Operative Store in New Liskeard, and resident about 4½ miles northwest of Haileybury, and adjacent farms. We have been unable to obtain any further information about this transaction. The Inco solicitor said there was nothing for publi-
