There is no living individual who is not concerned about the future of this whole inflamed world but the struggle seems remote and citizens are, naturally so, more concerned with their own daily problems; to iron them out, they look to their municipal bodies to provide good government and they should be prepared to support them whole heartedly in their task which contrary to popular opinion, is not easy.

The democratic way of life sprang from a desire to recognize each individual's right to happiness and, therefore, municipal government is the very core of the challenge which confronts the world today. If we feel helpless when we read of the continuing struggle for peace which to us means the democratic way of life, we should pause to remember that we can all do our share each day to see that the system has a solid foundation which is built in every town and village across Canada. It is the people's responsibility to see that sound, clear thinking men sit around the council tables. Those who have recognized their duty as citizens and have already assumed the responsibility of representing the people would do well to heed the advice of retiring Reeve Ann Shipley who continues on her way, leaving to her successors these thoughts: "Please, please, if you are a new councillor, go to the right man in your municipality and get advice. It may be an experienced mayor, a solicitor or a clerk-treasurer, but make sure you have somebody".

"Municipal finance is a thing apart," she said "and very difficult. Any municipal business is the biggest business in any municipality and the clerk or treasurer should be of a calibre commensurate with that business. You need the best man you can afford to buy to advise you in a business which is more complicated and beset by more pressures than any private businesses."

Stressing impartiality in political and labor problems in the community she said, "you are elected to represent the people and you are the only neutral body left."

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New Matarrow Mine Opens

The only base metal producer in the area, the New Matarrow lead and zinc mine was officially opened last Friday with J. Cunningham-Dunlop presiding. Also in attendance were Hon. Philip Kelly, Minister of Mines for Ontario, H. C. Rickaby provincial geologist and Bob Herbert, MLA for the District of Temiskaming.

Speaking before a large number of people who witnessed the ceremony, Mr. Cunningham-Dunlop spoke highly of the new mine's possibilities and gave as an example a figure of 200 tons of ore

which is the current daily production.

Mines Minister Kelly, praising prospectors and promoters for bringing lead and zinc mines into production, pointed out that the need for a road between Matachewan and Kirkland Lake was more important than ever before and he assured the gathering that he would bring the matter to the attention of the cabinet.
