Investigation reveals that New Liskeard has made arrangements with a contracting firm to oil the streets at a cost of \$186.00 per mile—over and above this is the hauling of sand so that the expense involved would be out of the question for Haileybury.

In the meantime, the town is endeavoring to get a supply of calcium chloride which citizens may purchase at a cost of roughly \$2.50 a bag to treat the roads fronting their homes.

O.N.R. to Assist in Promoting Tourist Industry

At a dinner meeting in the Hotel Haileybury recently, Colonel C. E. Reynolds D.S.O., M.C., Chairman of the O.N.R. and the Hon. William Griesinger, M.C., V.D., ONR Commissioner discussed several matters of importance to the town of Haileybury with attending representatives of the Chambers of Commerce, Mayors and clerks of the Tri-Towns.

Mayor A. H. Cooke suggested the building of a subway at the railway crossing on Browning street. The dangerous level crossing has been a source of concern for many years and recently the OPP pointed out to council that the tool shed obstructed the view of motorists. The railwaymen agreed to investigate the recommendation and take constructive action.

With a view to developing the

tourist industry in this part of country the Company will consider launching a tourist boat on Lake Temiskaming and assist in the construction of new docks. They would prefer that private enterprise be induced to take an interest in the potentialities of the Lake as a tourist attraction. Civic-minded citizens would like to see the building of a new dock south of the airport with facilities for repair and maintenance of boats so that safe and easy boating would be available to tourists.

The ONR officials stated that they would advise the company's publicity director to go all out in attracting tourists to this area this summer and winter. The Northern Ski Club where a new chalet will be in use this winter, has already established itself as an attraction for winter visitors and the director will investigate other interests here that might promote this industry through their advertising channels.

HOSPITAL GRANT

Two hospitals in Northern Ontario, two in Toronto and one in southwestern Ontario have just been awarded federal grants totalling \$519,200. Among them is the New Liskeard and District Hospital, now more than half completed which will provide space for forty patients and for a 17-bassinnet nursery as well as modern medicinal, surgical and obstetrical facilities. This hospital, which will receive a grant of about \$47,600, serves about 16,000 people in New Liskeard, Cobalt, Haileybury and surrounding townships.
