FALL FARE

"Season of mist and mellow fruitfulness
Close bosom friend of the maturing sun"

Glorious autumn days are on the wane and everywhere—available in abundance are the fruits of the harvester's toil—awaiting but the urge, the time, the new thought for the pot. And so, we present for your consideration, an assortment of recipes gathered in local homes, where each has been tried and proven both successful and delicious. Dust off those basement shelves, tie on your favorite apron and sail into that most satisfying of culinary chores—there is nothing to equal the aroma of chili sauce on the boil and few sights more pleasing than shining jars filled with wholesome garden produce.

MUSTARD PICKLE

1 qt. cucumbers, cut
1 qt. cucumbers whole
If small cucers are not available, use 2 qts cut
1 qt. silver skin onions.

3 cauliflower—solid part chopped.
1 qt. onions chopped.
6 sweet red peppers, chopped.
Put into separate dishes and cover with hot brine.
½ cup salt to 4 cups water.
Let stand overnight.
Make sauce of:
6 cups vinegar
8 cups brown sugar.
2 oz. mustard seed.
2 tps. celery seed.
Bring to a boil and add:
1 tsp. dry mustard.
1 cup flour
2 heaping tpsps. tumeric, moistened with vinegar.
Add vegetables which have been well drained.
Boil 5 minutes. Bottle.

GARLIC DILLS

Soak small cucers in ice water overnight. Pack in glass jars. Add to each one large piece of dill, one bay leaf, one clove of garlic, one good size piece of horse radish root, one small piece of alum (half size thumbnail). Bring to boil the following:
1 qt. white vinegar
3 qts. water
1 cup salt (little less)
Add 1 tbsp whole peppers (never shake pepper).
1 tsp mustard seed.
(If qts. use double quantities)
Fill jars as packed with liquid to cover and seal.

TOMATO BUTTER

10 lbs peeled tomatoes, quartered.

Leave in 1 qt. vinegar overnight.
In morning boil 10 minutes and skim. Add the following spices in a bag:
1 tpsp mixed whole spice
1 stick cinnamon
¼ tpsp. red pepper.
1 small tpsp salt.
Boil 3 hrs. slowly, add 3 lbs. white sugar. Let come to boil. Add three or four tpsp. corn starch mixed in cold water. depending on thickness desired.
Boil 5 mins.

Tomato Chutney

16 peeled tomatoes, cut up.
16 onions, cut up
16 apples, cut up.
4 hot red pepper.
4 hot green pepper.
1 pint white vinegar.
Boil together three hours.
