

N.H.A. Facilities Extended To Local Home Builders

Geologists, mining men, factory representatives and others in ever increasing numbers would like to settle in Haileybury but it's the old story of no housing accommodation.

Because many of them expressed a desire to build here if a financing plan could be secured, Mayor A. H. Cooke has been instrumental in having the lending facilities of the N.H.A. extended to Haileybury.

In a letter to R. C. Ballard, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation at North Bay, Mr. Cooke pointed out that Haileybury has no debts and no debentures, low assessment and tax rate and excellent schooling facilities. Moreover, he said, it is a beautiful residential town and ideal for this type of resident.

In his reply, Mr. Ballard stated that the lending facilities of the N.H.A. can be extended to Haileybury district provided the various applicants qualify under N.H.A. requirements.

Normally, most N.H.A. loans are handled on a joint basis with a lending institution but in municipalities of 5,000 or under, Central Mortgage handles the complete loan when it is approved.

House design booklets with available information are now in Mr. Cooke's hands, so that anyone interested in the plan may get their information from him. The only change in the literature should be the interest rate which is now 5½% and the applicant applies direct to the North Bay office rather than a lending institution.

Questionnaires and application forms are also available to be completed in triplicate and forwarded to the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation at North Bay. Approved sets of plans may be procured at a cost of \$10.00 a set of four.

CANADIAN CHEESE IS GOOD

There are 52 varieties of cheese available in Canada—variety enough to suit every taste. There is, for instance, the ever-popular Canadian Cheddar, which is sold according to age as new (mild) medium, and old (strong). Process cheese is another favorite. It is made from Cheddar which is ground and heated to pasteurization temperature, then poured into moulds, or packages to solidify. Also, many types of foreign cheese are now manufactured in Canada.

For more than 75 years, Canadian cheese had been noted for its fine quality. At the Philadelphia exhibition in 1876, Canadian cheese took top honors but it did not stop with winning the sweepstakes. There have been great improvements in the cheese industry here and we can now boast of having some of the finest tasting cheese in the world. In spite of all this, Canadian only use 4.7 pounds of cheese per person in a year, less than half that eaten by our neighbors to the south and far less than that consumed in many European countries.

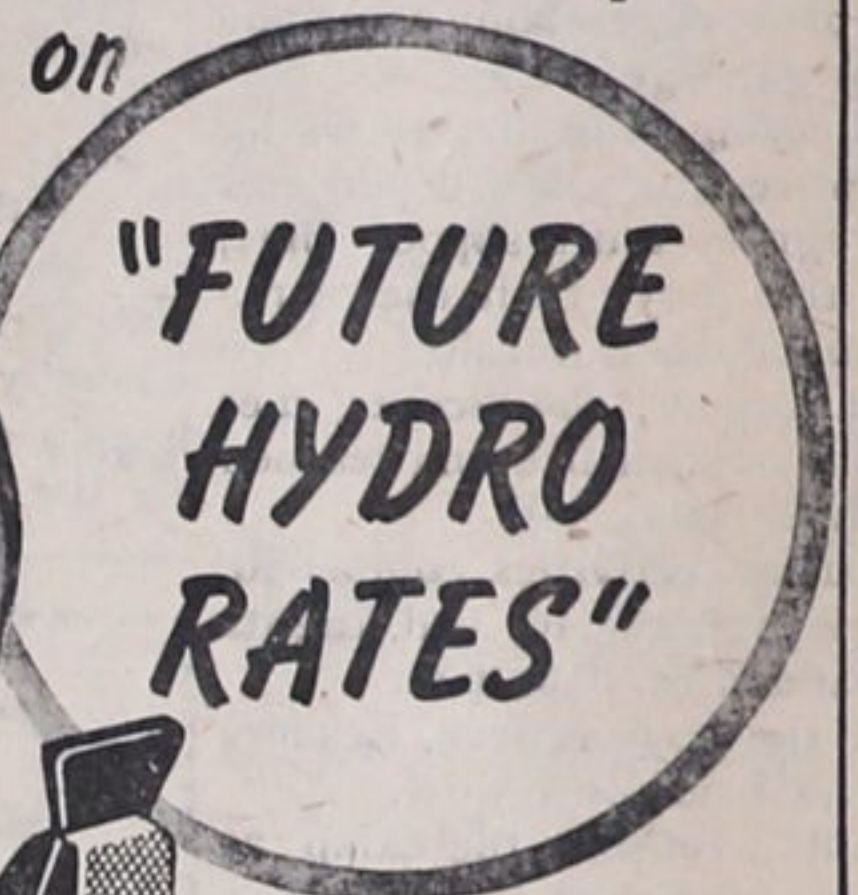
JUNO SAUCERS
