BUCKE TOWNSHIP DROPS HEALTH UNIT SERVICES

Bucke Township council meeting last week voted to withdraw from the Temiskaming Health Unit.

Council members felt that the three-mill levy, necessary to pay the municipality's share of the cost, was excessive for the service rendered.

It was also felt that a more favorable service could be obtained in its stead with a gratifying saving on taxes to the individual.

Excessive travelling expenses necessarily incurred by the Unit, make the charges far in excess of the services rendered to a township situated on the outside fringe of the territory covered.

This would only apply in a township with a low assessment resulting in a large increase in the mill rate, said Council members.

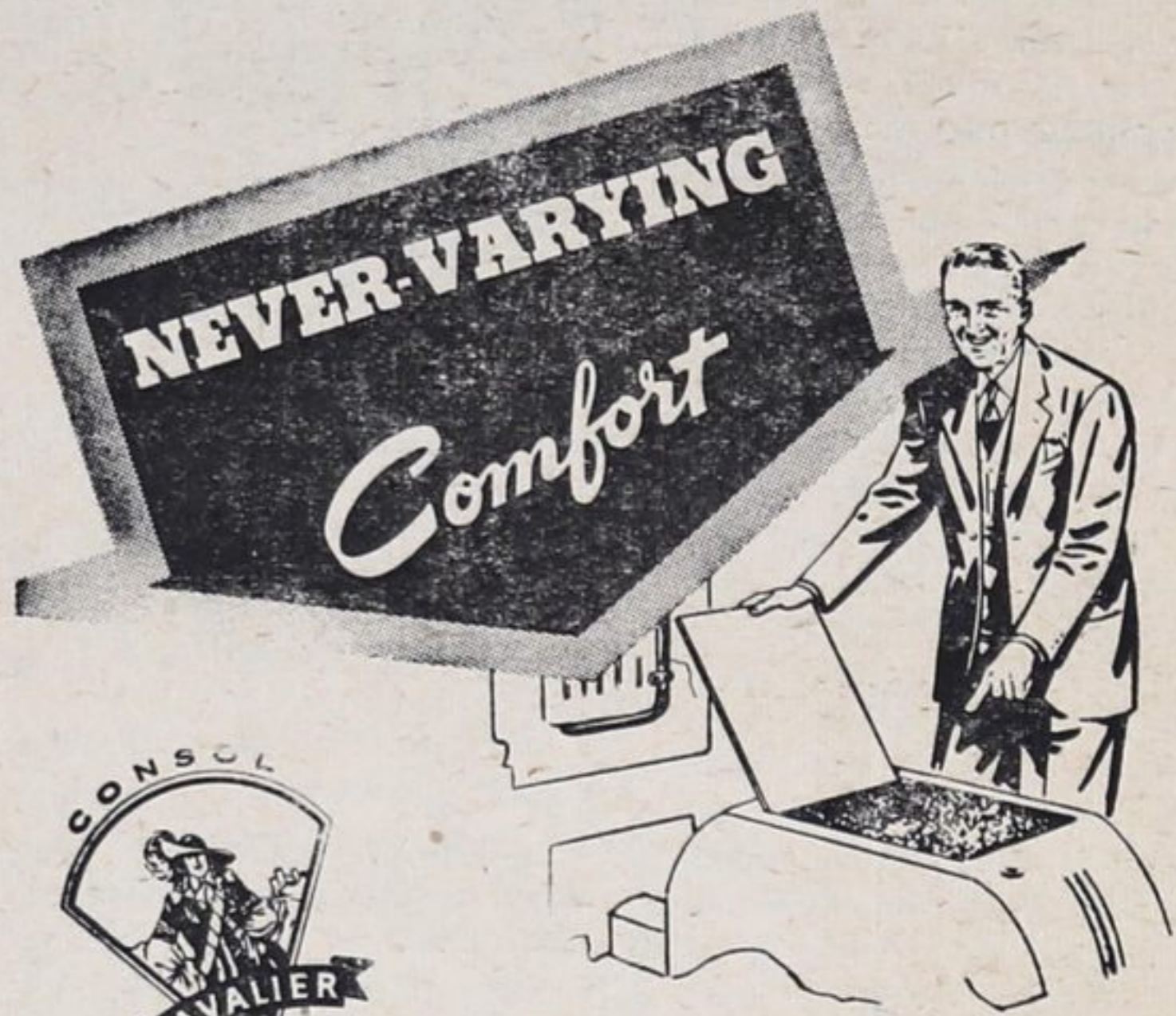
