Fire Destroys Cobalt Mine Building Tuesday

Hundreds of spectators watched a spectacular blaze which resulted in the destruction on Tuesday night of the dry and store room of the Mensilvo Silver Mine on the Hound Chutes road 21/2 miles southeast of Cobalt. The fire spread so rapidly that the Cobalt Fire Brigade could do little except prevent its spread.

There were about six tons of cobalt concentrates in the building but most of this can be recovered. Mine Manager William Tayor said there would be no hold up in mine operations.
