Quarterback Parcher threw a twenty-yard pass which McKelvie gathered in deep in New Liskeard territory. On the next play McKelvie carried the ball to the New Liskeard one-yard line, cunningly hiding the ball by holding it straight down by his side. Parcher went

over on the quarterback sneak for the major which was converted, to make the score 7-5.

Late in the fourth quarter the Miners attempted a field goal from the 30-yard line at a rather tricky angle. The three-point attempt was no good but the Miners scored a single point on the play when Taylor of Liskeard was rouged behind the goal-line. Taylor, a great Junior runner, sustained a severe ankle injury and had to be carried off the field.

Time ran out on the Liskeard squad, who tried to get back the three-point difference, leaving the

final score 8-5.

As a result of this game Cobalt High School Seniors win the Tri-Town Cup. New Liskeard Seniors and Mining School, both "B" schools, will play off for the "B" championship.

Cobalt Seniors will go to Smooth Rock Falls on Saturday, November 1st to play a sudden death game with the Smooth Rockers for the Northern Ontario "C" championship.
