Colony of Cranes Remembered by Local Man

Recent publicity on a wounded whooping crane that was flown to the United States prompted W. E. Vannier to call in and tell us something about these rare birds.

Twenty years ago Mr. Vannier was living in Rockland, Sask. which is some one hundred miles from Weyburn.

One fine day, he and his children went out into the country to cut some firewood. Much to their amazement, they suddenly happened upon a colony of cranes in a three-acre growth of poplar.

Eight nests stood twenty to thirty feet from the ground and measured five to six feet across. The long legged, long necked five foot high owners numbered between fifteen and twenty and had wingtip spread from five to six feet across.

Asked if they were at all dangerous, Mr. Vannier said, "No, they would not try to attack. One of the children climbed into a nest to get an egg (larger than a goose egg) without any trouble but the whoop sent up by the creatures was almost unbelievable. It was impossible to hear oneself speak," said Mr. Vannier.

It is believed that there are only about thirty-five of this crane family existing in Canada at the present time.

'Children Should Know Facts on Alcohol', Says C. C. Miller

Members of the Home and School heard Dr. C. C. Miller last week in address on "Social Drinking." Mr. Miller is a representative of the Ontario Temperance Foundation. After his fifteen-minute lecture, parents saw two films dealing with drinking and entitled "Liquor Lore and 'Family Affair'" which had been shown to pupils of Grades VII and VIII earlier in the day.

Mr. Miller dealt with the problem as it affected the children of today. His experience has made it clear that youngsters from all over the Province are anxious to know more about the subject and felt that they should be given the facts. As an example, he told of a heated argument which had taken place in a classroom of public school children as to whether or not there was any alcohol in beer. Because they had seen their parents drinking it so freely the children were quite convinced that there was nothing harmful in the drink.

"It is important", said Mr. Miller, "to let the youth of today know of the increasing number of individuals who have become alcoholics and to realize the dangers that lie ahead." In his talks with school children, attention is drawn to the detrimental effect of alcohol in the field of athletics.

Following Mr. Miller's address a question group was held. Mrs. H. E. Nauss acted in the absence of the president, Mrs. H. Jenkins.
