ganization, providing the various benefits at cost. The Act provides that an injured workman must accept the Board's award but he has the right of appeal. A compensable case in the final analysis is never-elosed. He cannot bring suit against his employer.

In the first year of operation 1915, the Board paid out only \$1,000,000 in claims for 17,000 accidents. In 1951, it paid claims totalling nearly \$25 millino in compensation and medical aid on 202,645 accidents reported.

One group not automatically covered is farmers, but they can make application for coverage The only group which cannot be covered under the Act is domestic servants.
