Two New Mining Companies Formed at Haileybury

Two new mining companies Ethel Copper Mines and Tud Cobalt Mines Limited have been incorporated recently with head offices in Haileybury.

Tud Cobalt Mines will have a four million dollar capitalization divided into four million shares of one dollar each. Ethel Copper Mines will have a capital of three million dollars divided into three million shares of one dollar each.

Purposes of the new companies are to acquire, own, lease, prospect for, open, explore, develop, work, improve, maintain and manage mines and mineral lands and deposits, and to dig for, raise, crush, wash, smelt, assay, analyze, reduce, amalgamate, refine, pipe, convey and otherwise treat ores, metals and minerals whether belonging to the company or not, and to render the same merchantable and to sell or otherwise dispose of the same or any part thereof or interest therein; and for the further purposes and objects set forth.

Provisional directors thereof are: Orville Hughes, Ian MacDiarmid, Margaret Hughes, Ruth Gordon and Bridget M. O'Hara.

Municipal Police Busy as Accidents Mar Holiday

Two serious car accidents and several minor collisions marred the holiday season in Haileybury. The hoped for objective of a repeat on last year's record of no accidents at all was shattered on Wednesday at 7.15 p.m. when Wm. Ferguson swung too wide at the Ferguson avenue-Main street turn, narrowly missed hitting an oncoming car and crashed into a car transport proceeding east on Main street.

The transport, carrying new model cars for Northern Ontario was travelling slowly down the hill in third gear but had no chance to come to a full stop before the approaching car crashed into the right hand side of the transport and was dragged some twelve feet. The drivers escaped without serious injury. Damage to the Ferguson car was \$450.00.

The same evening, Omer Allard and Ray Gouvreau collided at 10.45 at the corner of Ferguson avenue and Marcella street. Mr. Allard was attempting to back up because of icy conditions when the car driven by Mr. Gouvreau collided with his truck. Damage to the Gouvreau car amounted to \$100.00.

On Saturday night at 10.45, icy conditions were again responsible for an accident on Farr avenue when Bob Poppleton tried to pass a parked truck which had frozen up and crashed into the vehicle. Mr. Poppleton suffered minor lacerations and abrasions. The other two occupants of the car, Buddy Cooper and Jimmy Hicks, escaped without injuries. Damage to the new Meteor car amounted to \$600.00.

Other minor accidents occurred throughout the week, some of which were not reported. When the police learned of them and investigated, the persons involved had left the scene.

Three Thieves Get Heavy Sentences in Local Court

Heavy sentences were meted out in Magistrate's Court on Saturday morning when three men charged with breaking, entering and theft appeared before Magistrate Atkinson in Haileybury Court.

William Starchuk of Fort William will serve two years in Kingston Penitentiary and two years concurrent. Basil Surerus of Fort William was sent to Kingston for two years and one year concurrent. James McCooney of Hamilton will serve two years less one day concurrent in the Reformatory.

All three men were arrested by Ontario Provincial Police this month after the R. C. Smith Implement store in Englehart was broken into in the early hours of the morning. The thieves used a car stolen in Englehart to cart the office safe a short distance out on the Wabi Road where it was smashed open and its contents taken. The safe and stolen car were recovered the same day but a sum of money was missing.

Constable R. Metcalfe of the Englehart detachment recalled an earlier broadcast over the police radio alerting the service regarding a stolen car which was supposed heading for Port Arthur. He broadcast this information and the suspects were arrested in Matheson.
