

Northern Ski Club Plans Active Year at Cross Lake

The turn of the New Year saw a number of skiing enthusiasts limbering up on the beginners hill and in cross country runs on the lake. Just one more good fall of snow is needed to improve conditions to the skier's liking.

From here in, the Ski Club Chalet will be open every Saturday and Sunday and it is expected that skiers and spectators alike will spend many a happy week-end at one of Ontario's finest ski spots and in the comfortable new ski chalet with its big picture windows designed to view the exciting activity on the slopes.

On Friday night, the annual meeting will be held in the Blue Room of Hotel Haileybury at 7.30. All those interested in skiing and the welfare of the Club are invited to attend to elect the officers for the coming year and plan for social events to be held during the season.

Instruction for children and adults will begin this week-end. Every member is urged to enroll in these classes whether they consider themselves to be crack skiers or whether they are just learning the ropes for there is always something to be learned to improve skiing technique.
