of coming to Canada for their vacation than ever before. On file are 10,000 replies to 25,000 questionnaires mailed out last fall to Americans who had holidayed in Canada asking them for a frank opinion of the value received here for their vacation dollar. A majority reported good value and a good time for their money. Contrary to popular belief, as few as five per cent felt indignant about the discount on the dollar.

Northern Ontario summer camps were exempted from the recent warning of the head of the Travel Bureau that accommodation rates in the province were "frightening". In Northern Ontario, there had been no inclination for a tourist "stick-up".

Ninety per cent of the American tourist business crosses the border in cars and heads for the cool, green North, the mountains of the West or the Maritime beaches, and few come up against the "frightening" rates of the big city hotels and motels.
