

Liskeard Host at T.&N.O. Bonsel in February

The Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Curling Association held its annual meeting in Kirkland Lake recently and the biggest news to come out of the gathering was that its annual bonsel, one the largest in Northern Ontario, would be held in February in New Liskeard. That Mr. Pickard tells us that there are two ways to look after your rose bushes to protect them through the winter months... the first and most satisfactory method is to bring earth and bank them up to a height of about 10"... cover the bank with old leaves or corn stalks to keep the frost out... then, in late April, the litter can be removed from the banking and early in May the earth can be gradually be removed from the plant... the second method is to lift the roses and put them in a trench covering them with five or six feet of soil... replanting will be done about the 15th of May... roses may be cut down to within 10" to 1' above banking... and you who have been haunting the woods for little shrubs to enhance the beauty of your home... do not be discouraged because life is full of surprises, but the best time for this kind of gardening is in the spring... meantime remember that established evergreens give off moisture all through the winter months and so they should be watered during these dry October days.
