Mrs. N. J. McAulay Funeral Services First Woman Juror Held on Saturday In the North for Mrs. Williamson

History was made at the General Sessions of the Peace and District Court which opened on Monday with His Honor Judge John B. Robinson presiding, when for the first time a woman took her place with eleven men in the jury box. Mrs. N. J. McAulay of Haileybury was the only one of the three women not challenged when the jury was drawn to hear the case of the Coe brothers and James McCooey on a charge of automobile theft.

The two other women who were called were Mrs. C. V. J. O'Shaughnessy of Cobalt and Mrs. S. Mason whose home is 3 miles north of New Liskeard. A true bill was returned by the Grand Jury on Monday and the case went to the petit jury on Wednesday.

Harry A. Parker, prominent northern agriculturist, dropped dead in the New Liskeard arena on Saturday night. He would have been 63 on December 15th. He was a pioneer of the north coming to New Liskeard in 1897 with his father.

COBALT RE-ELECTS KEN. BUFFAM AS MAYOR OF THE TOWN

Mayor Ken Buffam won a sixth term as Cobalt's chief magistrate this week with a total of 423 votes as against 151 for C. R. Sopha and 144 for Gus Nadeau. "The people of Cobalt have been extremely kind to me and I appreciate it," he said, as he warned that it will be his last term in office.

For council, those elected were John Damiani 428, Eric Smith 346, Thomas Despres 310, Percy Lemon 301, W. C. Inch, Q.C., 292 and W. J. Moriarity 279.

EDNA SUMBLER ELECTED IN NEW LISKEARD COUNCIL CONTEST

In a quiet election with 2,205 persons whose names were on the voters' list, New Liskeard elected their first woman, Edna Sumbler, to a seat on the council for next year. Lorne Prentiss led the poll with 631 and was closely followed by J. Lowery Taylor with 626, and Charles Reid with 598. All three were former councillors.

New members are Patrick Bolger with 539 votes, Howard Wilkinson with 442 and Miss Sumbler with 423.



WEEK IN COURT

The Ontario Provincial Police are cracking down on speeders as evidenced in Magistrate Atkinson's court last week. Jean Louis Martel of St. Catharines, David Toner of Noranda, Gordon Pirie of Levack, Stanley Villneff of New Liskeard all paid fines ranging from \$15 and costs to \$30 and costs for speeding anywhere from 45 m.p.h. in New Liskeard to 80 m.p.h. in the northern township areas.

Other fines to drivers were paid by E. Bigelow of Englehart for failure to stop entering a through street; A. Belec of Kounyn for failure to signal before turning left on Highway No. 11 in Coleman; Arthur Prudhomme of Sturgeon Falls for failure to hold a chauffeur's license; Daniel Kirkbride of Englehart for driving without reasonable care for others; Donald Ellerton of Charlton whose horse-drawn buggy did not carry a lighted lamp showing white to the front and red to the rear; Leo Ryan of Charlton for driving without adequate brakes.

Charged With Impaired Driving After Accident

Wilfred Hewitt of New Liskeard has been charged with impaired driving and will appear in Magistrate's Court this week after an accident on the Lake Shore Road on Friday at five o'clock.

Driver of a half-ton truck heading north, Hewitt crashed into the back of a car owned by Henry Clutchey of Timmins. Mr. Clutchey had pulled off the east side of the highway in front of Dr. W. C. Arnold's to pick up Bill Timmins, a Provincial School of Mines student who was hitchhiking to his home in Tarzwell.

Damage was estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$200.00.

In a rousing election contest on Monday, the citizens chose Herbert A. Day to be Mayor for 1954, re-elected four of the present councillors for another term and gave a spanking big majority to Alex Mosher, a new comer to the municipal field, who headed the polls with 435 votes to be followed by D. H. Millar with 415 Donald Gardner, another new comer to the scene with 377 Charles Camsell with 376, Arnold Dempster with 303 and R. J. Poppleton with 300.

Mr. Day won the contest with a decisive majority of 135, leading Mayor Cooke in all four polls.

M. E. Whitby rolled up the big vote in the battle for a seat on the Board of Education, polling 384 votes, to be followed by Harry Jenkins with 313, Mrs. Wm. E. Bagshaw with 295 votes and a newcomer to the Board, Neil J. McAulay with 294.

The election saw 685 citizens casting their votes out of an eligible voters' list of 1,287 persons. The 53.22 percentage is considered to be an average response. In Haileybury's last election when Mayor Cooke defeated Robt. T. Trovhill, 67.68 per cent of the voters exercised their franchise. This was the highest percentage since 1947 when the final count showed 68.66—a record for the municipality.

Defeated candidates were Maurice Findlay, Percy Hitchen and Norman MacPherson trying for council and D. A. Hellens for the Board of Education.

Local Company Contractor for Shaft at Fecunis

A program of work will begin after New Year's on the Fecunis property of Falconbridge Nickel Mines with Temiskaming Construction Limited and Inspiration Mining and Development as joint contractors for the sinking of a 4000' shaft with outside measurements of 13' 11 1/2" by 19' 9 1/2".

The property is situated approximately two miles north of Levack. The first complete station will be cut at 2558' below the shaft collar and thereafter at 150' levels. Two hoists, one 5 drum diameter and one 8' drum diameter will be used to hoist muck from the bottom. Two Riddell mechanism shaft muckers will be used to load the 2 1/2 ton buckets.
