The grotto at the St. Mary's Academy was an impressive picture on Sunday evening when Catholic children led the open-air service with prayers for peace which were world wide on this day. As the setting sun reflected on the blue waters beyond the Academy grounds, Father L. Brunette led the procession from the church. In the forefront, youngsters carried the cross, then came the crusaders, the students of the convent, Grade XIII wearing their graduation caps, followed by citizens who had Father L. Landriault's words based on "Peace Through Charity" were carried to many through loud-speaking facilities.

Mrs. Leslie MacDonald of Toronto, a sister of the Rev. W. A. Beecroft, who for many years was minister of the Haileybury United Church, died last week as a result of injuries received in a motor accident at Englehart. The car driven by her husband collided with a half-ton truck at the intersection of Fourth Avenue and Highway No. 11.

The accident occurred as the MacDonald's were driving north to visit their son, Ronald, a graduate of the Provincial Institute of Mining who is with the Kerr Addison at Virginiatown. The truck was proceeding south and the front of the MacDonald car smashed into the right hand side of the truck as the driver, Sid Renaud, turned into Fourth Avenue.

Mr. MacDonald and another passenger, Mrs. Isabell Hurst of Toronto, were taken to the Englehart Hospital with minor injuries. A family of six with Mr. Renaud escaped injury.

## Plans Made for Organized Rugby in This Area

This month, a meeting was held in North Bay to form a football league in Northern Ontario. Since football has become a major sport in Canada, a group of communities in the north have taken an enthusiastic interest in sponsoring the sport. Football is not entirely new to the Tri-Town area. Exhibition games have been staged between Haileybury, Sudbury, New Liskeard, Noranda and North Bay in the past few years and the number of fans turning out to watch the games has been most encouraging.

It was felt that a meeting should be held to form an organized league with four participating clubs. The four clubs, Sudbury, North Bay, the Tri-Town area and Kirkland Lake were invited to North Bay to discuss this matter and the quorum met with success.

The representative groups decided to form a four-club league with each club playing six games, three at home and three away. The two leading clubs would then play a best-two-out-of-three for the championship and the cup. The cup was donated by Mr. Plaunt of Sudbury in memory of his brother who was killed overseas during the last Great War. It is a splendid looking trophy and we are indebted to Mr. Plaunt for his great gesture. It will be called the Plaunt Torphy.
