In 1904, when Haileybury was incorporated as a municipality, the population was 750.

There was a crinkled mushroom covered with white lilies with green velvet ribbons going in between the long loops of ribbon caught with a fancy ornament at the back, filled in underneath with green velvet ribbon. The prevailing tint at the opening was banana tint. There was a magnificent hat of this with two beautiful ostrich plumes."

Three Ordained by Bishop Wright at St. Paul's Church

The morning sun shed its brilliant light on a colorful procession from the parish hall to the St. Paul's Anglican Church on Thursday morning last week.

This was the beginning of the Ordination Service when many people have the privilege to enjoy and most only once in a lifetime. So it was that people from Haileybury and the surrounding district who came to take part in this special Ascension Day service filled the church and they stood through the ceremonies.

It was an occasion of particular pride here and in Cobalt, for one of those ordained, Peter Park, was the first one from this district to go into the Sacred Ministry. In an impressive service, His Lordship, Right Rev. W. L. Wright, D.D., D.C.L., Lord Bishop of Algoma ordained Mr. Park, who studied at St. John's College, Manitoba; Leslie Peterson of Noranda, who studied at Huron College, London, Ontario, and Harry Morrow, who studied at Montreal. The candidates were presented to the Bishop by Archdeacon J. Lindsell of North Bay. Special choir music was sung and the Rev. J. E. Jordan, Cobalt rector, sang the Litany Holy Communion was then given for the newly ordained deacons and their relatives.

On Thursday evening a special service was conducted in St. James Church, Cobalt, by Rev. Jordan. Bishop Wright preached the sermon. Also assisting were the newly ordained deacons, the Rev. H. Morrow, taking the Psalm, the Rev. L. E. Peterson the first lesson and Rev. Park, the second lesson.

On behalf of the W.A. of St. James Church, the Bishop presented Mr. Park with his red stole. Earlier he had received his white stole from his sister, Miss Diana Park of Toronto and his green stole from his brother, Ramsay Park of Belleville.

Other clergymen at the service were Canon Callotin, Sault Ste Marie, Canon C. Goodier, Haileybury, Canon H. A. Sims, New Liskeard; Rev. A. L. Chabot, New Liskeard; Rev. Reginald Inshaw, Orreau and Rev. J. H. Watson, of Gravenhurst.

Earlier in the week at a confirmation service here, seven children from Haileybury were confirmed—Eleanor McFarlane, Joan Dinesen, Ann Campbell, Marilyn White, Gill Robson, Joyce White and Keith McPherson.

WEEK IN COURT

Rotarians Hear Talk on Adventure in Citizenship

Rotarians enjoyed "An Adventure in Citizenship" with Bill Rice at their Monday luncheon. The young student gave members an excellent word picture of his recent trip to Ottawa to participate with 176 other Canadian boys in this annual project which has attracted so much attention that the Mayor and twenty-four members of Rotary of Johnson City for the opening day presenting Rotarians with a stand of United Nations flags.

At a civic reception, Dr. Douglas Piercey, president of the Ottawa Rotary gave the official welcome and said "You are invited to your own Capitol City."

At dinner at the Chateau Laurier on Wednesday night, Temiskaming M. P., Ann Shipley joined the three Northern students. They were presented with a book of the Capital cities of the world with a prophecy "that fifty years from today, Canada's Capital would be the most beautiful."
