ONR Picture Brighter With Cost Cutting

For the first time in several months, the Ontario Northland Railway has shown an increase in gross earnings, the monthly report of the railway for August shows. The decline shown in the latter part of last year continued through 1954 until last month.

Despite the drop in gross, however, the railway has been showing an improvement in net as a result of lower expenses. For the first seven months of the year, gross revenue was down \$708,062, but the expenses were down by \$826,258. The improvement of \$70,756 in gross earnings for August, plus a cut in August expenses of \$10,940, left net earnings for the first eight months nearly \$200,000 better than last year.

Firemen Carry Out Full Program in Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week is considered to be one of the most important and progressive steps forward towards teaching children and adults alike to use their heads and prevent tragedy from striking.
