On Friday, Haileybury High School took sole possession of first place in the local NOSSA league with an 11-5 conquest of Noranda High.

The locals, after the opening kick-off marched down the field for their first major win with Connelly carrying the ball over the goal line. Noranda however came back before the end of the first half to tie the score on a pass from the twenty yard line. Both converts were blocked.

There was no further scoring in third quarter. However in the fourth with time running out Fleming booted the ball into the Noranda end zone and a costly error by Noranda with Connelly recovering gave Haileybury the lead 10-5. Fleming then flicked a rouge on the last play of the tilt to clinch it by the score of 11-5.

In their other game of the past week the locals swamped Matachewan 26-0, with the touchdowns going to Parent, with two Poppleton, O'Grady and Bond. The loss for Matachewan left them with but a mathematical chance of winning the league.

Haileybury can now take the championship by winning their remaining three games. Two wins would leave them no worse off than a tie for first place.

without changing the policy but when all was said and done, the lot 89 Plan M-46 was sold for the assessed value of \$175.00 and the prevailing thought was that there could be exceptions to the rule depending on the circumstances. However, Councillor Millar said "We should not abandon the policy entirely but make exceptions when warranted."

Passed a motion that the house and lot 71, Plan M-128 on Fourth Street be offered for sale to Elphege LaForge at \$550.00. If refused it will be open for sale to any purchaser.

Heard Councillor Mosher on the subject of another light at the school auditorium. "The lighting into the school is still dangerous and requires an additional 200-watt bulb on Rorke Avenue."

Heard the motion that By-law "1036, being a by-law to install water lines on certain streets be read a first and third time. This was the result of a two-hour discussion on the pros and cons of installing a sewer as well. Big-

gest fly in the ointment was the result of a citizen's poll taken after the last meeting which showed that eleven home owners wanted both services, three were for water only, one was against everything and four failed to register any thoughts on the matter. A two-third vote was necessary representing half the assessment. Councillor Millar said that "he would like to see the people have both services but is it sensible? I really do doubt the wisdom of this. In many communities, there are no sewers; they have septic tanks. We have no assurance that next year's building will in any way compare with the past five years and meantime, there are eighty serviced lots in town." Until there are enough home owners, the Councillors could not see his way clear to financing the project. The Mayor agreed and the decision was made to get permission from the Municipal Board for the installation of a water line only, as soon as possible.

Instructed the clerk to advise the Health Unit to check up on the sanitation of conveyances and methods of packing by transient meat vendors. All Councillors were of one mind "That the vehicles were filthy" and as Councillor Millar pointed out "Why people buy meat from this type of vendor, I do not know."

Passed a motion that a whole new dog by-law be drafted by A. Mosher and his committee which would be discussed and passed at the next meeting. The nuisance caused by stray animals was voiced by Councillor Poppleton who said that "last week I could have gladly choked seventeen dogs."

Studied a demonstration given by a representative of Darling Company of their fire hydrants and left the decision to purchase necessary hydrants to the Committee who would act on the Fire Chief's advice. Discussed the immediate amount of work facing the Town Foreman in every direction and recognized the handicaps under which he is operating when it seemed apparent that the loader purchased two years ago was not satisfactory and the work of the grader was limited.
