Accident Proves Fatal to Former Haileybury Man

Overcome by exhaust fumes from his car while he was working on it in a closed garage on Sunday morning, Walter Edward Holmgren, 52, of the Prescott Highway died shortly afterwards of carbon monoxide poisoning. Mr. Holmgren was well known in Haileybury, where with his family, he had resided for ten years while associated with Sullivan Machinery, later to become Joy-Sullivan.

In 1951, they went to Ottawa where he was Chief of the Ottawa branch of the National Production Authority (Canadian Division) of the United States Department of Commerce.

Mr. Holmgren had been working in his yard in the morning and when Mrs. Holmgren went out at 11:00 a.m. to take out the car, she found him slumped unconscious over the fender. A fire department emergency squad gave the unconscious man oxygen and rushed him to the Civic Hospital but he was dead on arrival. Coroner Dr. W. Thomas Kendall said that death was accidental and no inquest will be held.

Mr. Holmgren was a native of Ironwood, Michigan, and a graduate of the University of Michigan in Mining Engineering. He had spent 18 years in Canada. While here he was an active director and member of the Haileybury Golf Club.

In 1929, in Paris, France, he married Elsie Nicholson. She survives him, together with a son, Roger of Ottawa; three daughters, Misses Joan, nurse-in-training at the Toronto Western Hospital and Elizabeth, at home and Mrs. R. G. Doyle of Bonne Terre, Mo.

Seventy-eight year old Alfred Player of New Liskeard, missing for two days in the bush west of here, was brought out by five searchers, who found him at 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday and stayed overnight with him.

Alfred Hawkins and David Sharp of New Liskeard found the dazed and weary man who had been missing since Monday when he went on a hunting trip with Garry Frisby and George Sedore. They left him close to the road while they went off to look for deer and on their return could not locate him for he had wandered off on his own.

One hundred volunteers joined the 2-day search party. Aiding the OPP in its organization was George Cardy and other members of the New Liskeard Rod and Gun Club. Planes piloted by Jerry Quinlan and Jack Hope also assisted in the search.
