## Council Wrangle With Problem of Tramp Dogs

In a determined effort to finish up any business that has been hanging fire during the past year, Councillor Alex Mosher asked Council to put through amendment to the dog by-law at the last regular meeting of this year's Council at 8:30 on Monday night. The essence of the whole matter was the clause which states that dogs must be

put up from May 1st to August 20th. If the law is not observed dogs will be kept at the pound for three days during which time the owner may re-possess the dog—\$1.00 for the first day and \$2.00 for every additional day. Failure to pick the canine up after three days will result in destruction. In the case of a second offence, the dog will be taken to the pound and destroyed.

Previous to passing the amendment it was apparent that neither the Mayor or Councillors Camsell and Poppleton were satisfied that the amendment was the answer. However they made it clear that when the trouble first arose, they were of the opinion that an amendment such as Councillor Mosher's and Councillor Gardner's was necessary. In the past few months, they had realized that the complaints were still pouring in. Mr. Day observed that "if the by-law is amended and a dog is an infernal nuisance in the winter months when he is allowed to run at large, then we have no ground to stand on." R. Poppleton said "A dog should always be under someone's control. The owner should at least know where the dog is. Should it be allowed to tear everything to pieces?" "Frankly" he said, "I don't know where we should begin or end. The last time our dogs ended up in the papers in England."

Mayor Day said he thought the answer lay in the observation of a gentleman who stated that "a dog can be trained under one condition. If the man knows more than the dog." Councillor Mosher offered to leave his proposals for the incoming Council since everyone seemed to be against it but Councillor Camsell caught him up with "You said no unfinished business tonight" and finally when all was said and done with Councillor Camsell defending a good dog as protection for children, and as watch dogs and Councillor Mosher expressing the view that by next fall, all tramp dogs would be disposed of fast under the new regulations, the amendment was passed.

## R. C. TOMBS RE-ELECTED TO PRESIDENCY OF SOUTH TEMISK. CIVIL SERVICE

At the annual meeting of the South Temiskaming Branch of the Civil Service Association held this month in New Liskeard R. C. Tombs of Haileybury was re-elected to the presidency. The first vice-president is Roy Edgar and second vice president is Stewart Frew, both of New Liskeard. For the coming year Miss Leonore Edwards will be in charge of finances and Miss Beth Blair, who has been both secretary and treasurer will continue as secretary. ## What Council Did

Could see no particular hurry and therefore took no action on requests from the Northern Ontario Natural Gas Company Ltd and the Intercounty Natural Gas Company Ltd, requesting a franchise to distribute natural gas in the community.

Put themselves on record as unanimously in support of the special Northern Ontario delegation and brief urging the Federal Government to locate the proposed Trans-Canada Natural Gas pipe line along Highway No. 11. The brief is to be presented on the 21st of the month.

Agreed to sell the west half of Lot 41, Plan M-37 to Mrs. Anna B. Faulkner for the sum of \$75.00

Heard Councillor Mosher leave a recommendation for next year's Council advising them of the deplorable conditions at the town dump and that the whole situation should be taken up with the Collector. "Something must be done right away to see that dumping is done properly over the lips" he pointed out.

Heard the monthly police report and noted that "there has been an increase in break ins. On most of them reported, it has been found that the person or person responsible have gotten away with little or nothing at all. The one major break-in at a local store is still under investigation. To try and combat this increase in crime, the officers have increased their hours on night patrol from 3.00 a.m. to 5.00 a.m."

Passed a motion stating that Monday, January 3rd will be a holiday for all town employees. As far as the rest of the town is concerned, Council agreed with the Mayor that they do not have the authority nor is it their concern if the merchants do or do

## Tennis Activities Reviewed in Club's Annual Report

The Executive Committee consisting of J. Valentine, J. H. White, K. Valentine and F. Audet are presenting the statement of income and expenses for the past season's operations.

The Club had a fairly successful year from the point of view of a large increase in junior membership and a further increase in senior membership. The total membership exceeded seventy. This year a junior tournament was initiated, with the winning of trophies by Sandra Clark for the girls and Harold Hammerstrom for the boys. Two senior tournaments were held—one a local one, and one a special Jubilee tournament. At the Jubilee tournament, four towns competed—Cobalt, Haileybury, New Liskeard and Ville Marie. The Club donated a cup which is to be called the Jubilee Trophy, and will be competed for annually in Haileybury.

The building costs owed to Temiskaming Builders have been reduced annually at the rate of five hundred dollars per annum and the coming 1955 season should see the clean-up of this account. After this, further needed improvements can be made to the club property.

We hope that the coming season, 1955, will see junior competition pick up considerably with inter-town competition to be instituted.

A car in front of Dr. Ledwell pulled up to a stop on the shoulder and with one parked on the other side of the road the two cars, one proceeding north and one south collided.
