Sawdon of the Sackville Tribune-Post, president of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, as a guest on the show.

During the 15 years of its existence, the Ontario Neighborly News commentators have scanned more than 150,000 copies of the English-language weeklies of Ontario and Quebec, and have read on the air more than 30,000 items totalling some million-anda-half words.
