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School Boards Ask Council for Safety Measures for Pupils

A special meeting of the Haileybury Town Council for the purpose of studying the estimates of the annual budget was held on Monday evening. The Mayor and Councillors D. H. Millar, W. C. Arnold, Neil Fleming, L. Simard and Sam Craig being present.

Before proceeding with the main business of the evening a deputation of military authorities appeared and made a request on behalf of the O/C for the permission of the Council to make use of some vacant land in the southeast part of the town, formerly occupied by the brickyard.

Council was informed that the reason for the request was that the Army was undertaking a series of training exercises for the armored section of the local militia company, whose equipment includes a tank and auxiliary transport.

When the question was raised by Council as to the possibility of damage to the streets to be traversed between the Armouries and the training ground, assurance was given by the officers that the broad treads of the equipment so distributed the weight that there would be no

The average mean temperature for March, 1955, was 24.7 compared with 20.4 for 1954, and since 1894 the average has been 18.9.

The maximum temperature for March, 1955, was 54 and for 1954 it was 43 with a high since 1894 of 70.6 in 1905.

The minimum temperature for March was 12 below zero in March, 1955 and 7 below in 1954 with the lowest in 1900 with 33.8 below in 1900.

Cancer Society Appeals for Funds To Further Work

Temiskaming's cancer sufferers goes into operation in Cobalt, Haileybury, New Liskeard, Charton Englehart, Matachewan and Elk Lake. Making this annual appeal is the Temiskaming Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society.

"We are now doing as much work in the southern part of the Temiskaming District as we do up here," Mrs. G. F. Elliot, an executive member of the unit, pointed out today. We hope that we will get good support so as to be able to maintain our much needed services.

Services include the operation of a cancer clinic alternate months in New Liskeard and Kirkland Lake, the supply of dressings to scores of patients, coverage of travel expenses in certain cases to Toronto or other places where special treatment is given, and a program of educational instruction for the general public about cancer.

In order to make known the unit's urgent needs, 3,500 letters went out this morning to chosen names throughout southern Temiskaming. Each carried the signature of R. Healy, president of the unit.

The educational program of the Cancer Society in Temiskaming includes the supply of speakers on cancer to local organizations supply of free booklets to all requesting them, supply of films on the diagnosis of the disease and other services.

Half the battle in the cure of cancer lies in catching it early," Dr. Harris, medical adviser to the unit says. The Canadian Cancer Society is working to persuade people to contact their doctors immediately they feel any symptoms that could possibly be associated with the disease.

Funds raised by the Temiskaming Unit also go to support the Canadian Cancer Society's research work which is constantly progressing towards the eventual solution of the cancer menace. The Society has been responsible for many of the discoveries that have done much to alleviate suffering from the disease. Meanwhile its research workers, including some of the world's best known experts on the subject, are continuing their investigations into the cause of cancer.
