School Boards Ask Council for Safety Measures for Pupils

(Continued from Page 1) more danger of damage to the road than there is from automobiles or truck traffic.

On the strength of this assurance, Council gave the assured permission.

A deputation of Board of Education and Separate School Trustees appeared before Council with the object of trying to devise some tangible method of reducing the danger to both school children and adults from traffic accidents in the vicinity of both the Public and Separate Schools.

Messrs. T. Tulloch and H. A. Doran represented the Board of Education and Gordon Davies represented the Separate School. Each of these gentlemen were quite emphatic in their opinions that the situation was quite serious and that it was advisable that the united efforts of the school boards, the Council and the Home and School Board should be concentrated on the problem.

It was generally agreed that the deputation and the Councilors that a flashing overhead light at both north and south approaches to the school areas would be likely to cause motorists to slow down when their attention was arrested by such lights but it was pointed out that last year when such a light at the corner of Main Street and Rorke Avenue was requested, the Highway Department, raised objections.

Councillor Fleming said that he had been informed that some Quebec centres the speed limit was reduced to 20 miles in school areas.

Councillor Simard showed the meeting some diagrams illustrating warning signs which are made use of in some towns, and it was agreed that if permission could be secured from the Highway and Provincial Police authorities to use them some improvement might be expected.

Mr. Simard was authorized to interview the police and the Highway authorities.
