Under great difficulties, the douncil's work has, in the past, been carried on from two separate buildings, a converted residence dating from Queen Victoria's time and a one-floor annex nearby. When this now obsblete headquarters was first taken over as a clearing house for the council's activities there were less than a dozen on the staff-Today there are 39.

From this old dwelling in Ottawa the council has diligently worked towards raising Canadian standards of social welfare by stressing modern methods, careful budgeting, good administra tion and proper planning. Besides greatly increasing the quarters for the permanent council staff, two of the most important features of the new headquarters will be an enlarged library and provision of assembly room.

"The Atkinson Charitable Foundation has very generously agreed to equip the library and assembly room by reason of a \$9,333,45 grant. and I am sure this investment will prove a real contribution toward meeting problems in new and uncharted areas of the social welfare field." said R. E. G. Davis, Canadian Welfare Council executive secretary.


The library is of prime importnce to the Welfare Council in all phases of its operations, and to those dependent on the council for assistance, Mr. Davis explained. The Assembly Room likewise will greatly improve headquarters facilities. In the past it has been necessary to engage outside quarters for meetings at extra cost to the council. The assembly room as planned will accommodate 100 persons and will be suitable for study workshops, conferences committee meetings and other activities involving large and small groups.

"Primarily the library is being reorganized to provide information in the searching studies of social welfare problems, and this material is available to all professions." said Mr Davis. "A special effort is made to collect and preserve material not found elsewhere. Canadian social welfare literature, unpublished surveys and reports, documents prepared by the council itself. are among the items of its por-

ticular concern. "Further," Mr. Davis continued "it will provide our own staff as well as other professional and voluntary welfare workers, with materials of immediate concern to them in meeting contemporary problems. It will provide a repository for documents of particular interest within the social welfare field and by co-ordinating the collection of materials with other libraries. prove a most valuable service at modest cost.
