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## Temiskaming Presbyterial Holds Annual Meeting at Englehart

The 29th annual meeting of Temiskaming Presbyterial of the Women's Missionary Society of the United Church of Canada was held in the United Church, Englehart, Thursday, May 19th. The president, Mrs. O. T. Orr, who presided at all sessions, extended a warm welcome to the delegates, numbering well over a hundred and coming from as far north-east as Noranda and all intermediate points to as far south as Latchford, with guest speakers from Toronto.

A very impressive worship service was conducted by Charlton Affiliated Society on the theme "The Hope of the World." Christianity is the hope of the world and is brought about by prayer. To pray we must have faith and it is by prayer that we enter heaven. The serving of communion by the pastor Rev. F. S. Jennings concluded the worship service. A moment of silent prayer was observed in memory of those members who had gone on to higher service during the past year.

Reports presented by the various secretaries were most encouraging. They revealed an increase in membership, keener interest in the work and allocations generously over-subscribed. Several discussion groups were conducted by the secretaries affording new officers an opportunity to present any problem appertaining to their work.

The guest speaker for the afternoon session was Mrs. G. K. Howe of Toronto, 1st vice president of the the Toronto Conference Woman's Missionary Society. She spoke on "Life's Fifth Dimension" or "The Shadow Cast by Our Unconscious Influence." We cast a small or large shadow of influence on everyone with whom we come in contact. Is our loyalty to God or to man? Mrs. Howe asked the thought-provoking question: "What Shadow of influence are we exerting today that makes young graduates ask as they

seek their first position "What money can I make" instead of "How can I serve?" Mrs. Howe reviewed the work of the Woman's Missionary Society, drawing the attention of the gathering to the fact that service is rendered to people of all ages, from the new born babe to those in the twilight years of life. In raising the standard of living through improved food production, sanitation, medical assistance and education, the Woman's Missionary Society endeavours to serve God by serving man. Mrs. Howe concluded her address by emphasizing that all money contributed to the organization must be used for their ever-increasing programme of service to mankind.

## Rules Governing Rotary Club's Square Dancing Contest

The Haileybury Rotary Club wishes to announce a square dance contest for Primary and Secondary Schools of Temiskaming and district to be held at the Rotary Summer Fair in Haileybury at the Armouries July 28, 29, 30. All schools in Temiskaming and district from Temagami to Elk Lake and Gowganda are invited to send entries. Trophies and plaques will be presented to the winning teams. Children dancing to help the Rotary Club raise money to help Cripple Children.

### Rules and Regulations

1. Each set shall consist of four boys and four girls. Each set, for their optional, dance shall have either a boy or girl caller.
2. An individual shall call or dance for one set only.
3. All participants from Primary Schools must be in Grades 5, 6, 7 or 8. All participants from Secondary Schools must be attending the school they represent.
4. Entries close on July 28th 1955.
5. A registration fee of two dollars (\$2.00) must accompany all entries. This amount will be refunded following the competition.

6. All sets will be scored on a point basis. The highest pointing sets in each evening's preliminaries will be invited back to compete in the finals.

7. Scoring—Judges score sheet in Primary and Secondary groups attached.

8. Recorded music will be used for all preliminaries. Live Music will be provided for finals.

9. A panel of judges will be provided.

10. **Compulsory Dances** — The Tournament Caller will call one of the following dances: Dip and Dive. Forward For on the Head, or the Texas Star. Each set will draw for the dance before going on stage.

11. **Optional Dances** — Each will be required to dance on change of their own choosing. change must not last over seven minutes. The call may be in French if desired.

12. **Variations** — for the Compulsory Dance, the Tournament caller may call at his own discretion: Allemande left, allemande right, grand chain, do-si-do, promenade, swing, saute your partners, salute your corners circle left, or any combination of these.

13. **Dress** — The type and style of dress is entirely at the discretion of the competitors. School colors would add greatly to the interest of the competition. However, as indicated in the scoring sheet, reasonable uniformity is desirable.

14. **Time of Competition** — Commencing at 7:15 p.m. on the evenings of July 28, 29, 30. Exact times for each set to be announced.

15. Each school may enter two sets.
