The higher boarding rates for the care of the Society's children in foster homes were anounced at the monthly board meeting held in the Hotel Hailbury on Tuesday. New boarding rates are: \$30 a month for infants and children up to three years; \$28 a month for children between the ages of three and 10 years and \$30 a month for children 11 years and over.
