Complaints have been received from operators of saw mills and pulpwood slasher mills on the Ottawa River that marked logs with nails inserted are being continually discovered in their mills. This condition is not only damaging to equipment but endangers the lives of mill workers.

There is also a quantity of pulpwood, principally in the small four-foot lengths, burned on the shores each year, and thefinancial oss because of this is considerable.

The theft, misuse or misappropriation of marked logs in any number is prohibited by law, and any evidence received of these practices will be submitted to Crown authorities through our legal representatives for appropriate action.
