

Two Salvation Army Leaders For Cobalt and Haileybury

For the first time in 2½ years there has been a change of leaders in the Salvation Army charge of Cobalt and Haileybury. Lt. Basil Craddock left last week for a new post in Newmarket. Henceforth the charge is to be jointly headed by two young officers who yesterday preached their welcome services in both towns. They are 2nd Lt. Wilmot Linder, 25 of Woodstock, N.B. and Lt. Reginald Gage, 33 of Brampton.

Both single, the officers say, "We are here to serve the residents of the towns—practically and spiritually."

Lt. Gage is fresh from Salvation Army College in Toronto and this is his first appointment; but 2nd Lt. Linder served previously with the army as an assistant in High River Alberta. For him the new job in the Cobalt-Haileybury charge is a promotion.

"I am fascinated by the trees here." 2nd Lt. Linder stated. "Alberta is devoid of them." Lt. Gage joins his spiritual partner in commending the kindness and friendliness of the people here.

The newly appointed officers aren't losing any time and plans are now complete for holding the Daily Vacation Bible Class. A regular annual feature of the S. A. Classes will be held July 11th to 15th, between 10 a.m. and noon at the army hall in Haileybury.

The program, especially designed, includes recreational devotional for children five to 16 years of age, and educational aspects.

"In this project we will be assisted by the young people's workers" 2nd Lt. Linder revealed. "The course has room for 100 boys and girls and daily prizes will be offered. On July 15th at

8 p.m. in Haileybury there will be a graduation to which the public is invited.

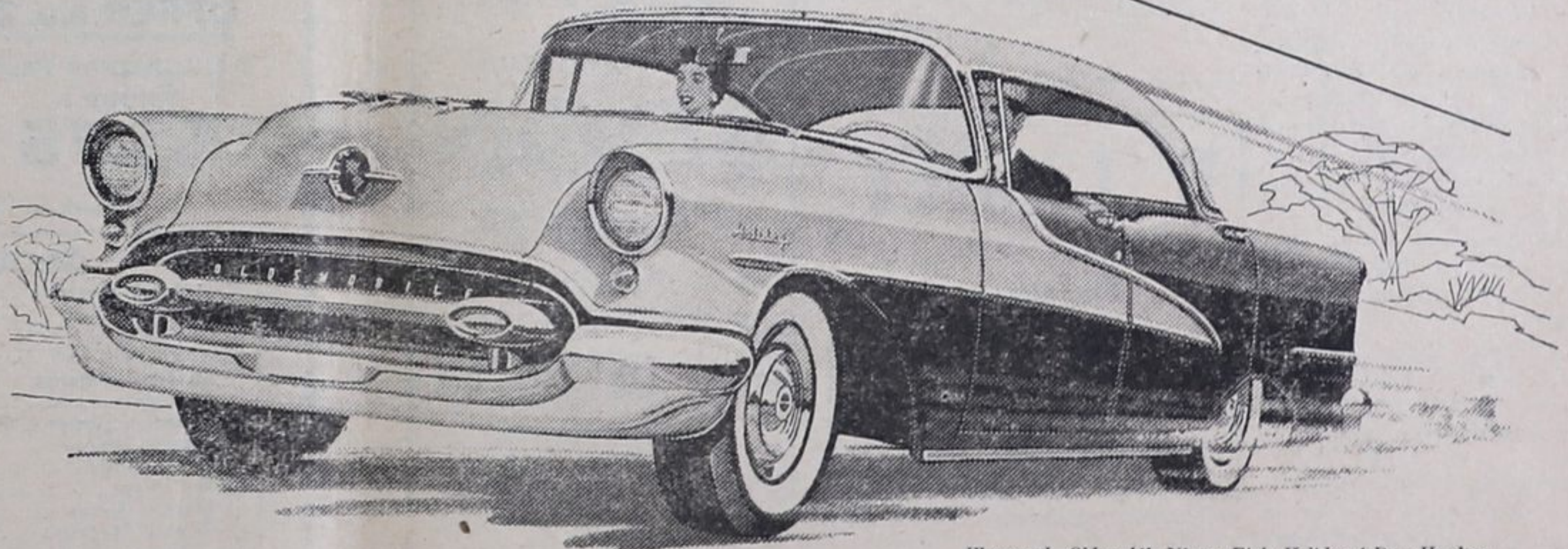

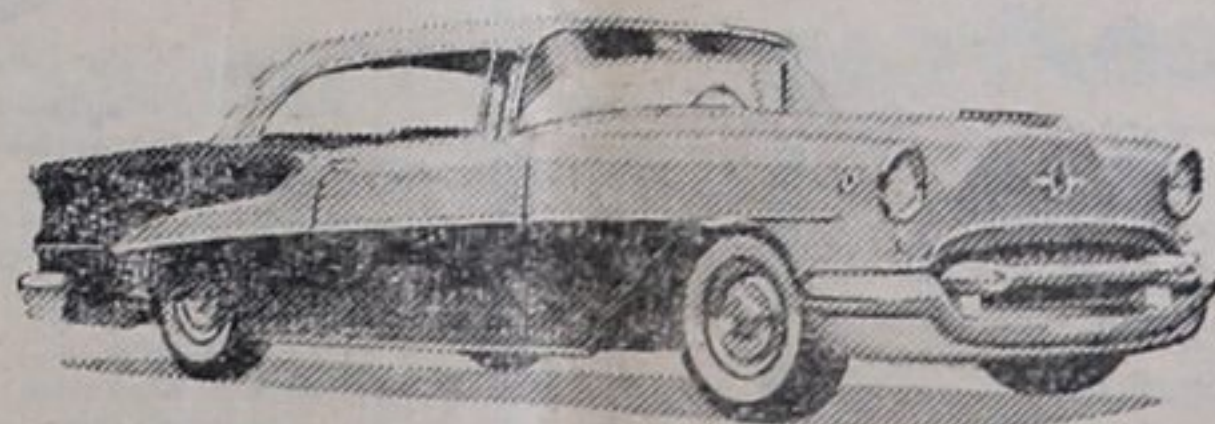
