Swim Lessons at Rotary Beach

Can your children Swim? The Rotary Club with the co-operation of the Recreation Commission and the Red Cross will teach your child or children to swim and what to do in case of an emergency. For instance if a boat or canoe tips over and every one is thrown in to the water turn the boat back over and climb in as any boat or canoe will hold at least four people up even if it is full of water.

Every child in Haileybury should be an excellent swimmer and trained in water Safety—and that is the aim of the Haileybury Rotary Club.

Ruth Cumming and Harold Hammerstrom have just returned from taking a Red Cross swimming instructor's course at Timmins, so both instructors are qualified instructors. But at any beach the co-operation of the parents and the children is of prime importance in seeing that the children behave properly and obey the instructors and observe safety rules.

Parents please note "DO NOT SEND CHILDREN UNDER (9) down to the beach unattended. The Life Guards are not baby sitters.

9.00 a.m. Seniors and Intermediates.

10.00 a.m. Beginners (class 1) over eight.

11.00 a.m. Beginners (class 1) eight and under.

2.00 p.m. Seniors and Intermediates.

3.00 p.m. Beginners (class 11 over eight).

4.00 p.m. Beginners (class 11 eight and under).

5.00 p.m. Adults and Diving.

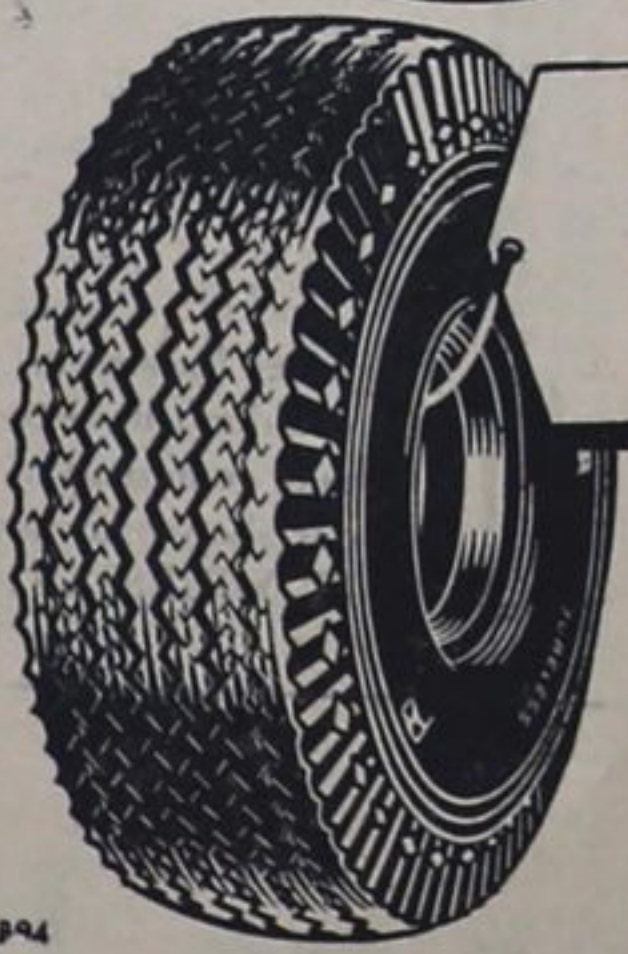
