Annette Belair, 14 year old Cobalt girl was saved from drowning at the Haileybury beach Wednesday afternoon. The girl pulled one rescuer under three times before she was dragged to shore by Life Guard Harold Hammerstrom assisted by Carol Jenkins of Haileybury.

Any local girl who wants to enter can contact Norm Gentile or Tom Burns at the Empire Theatre, New Liskeard.

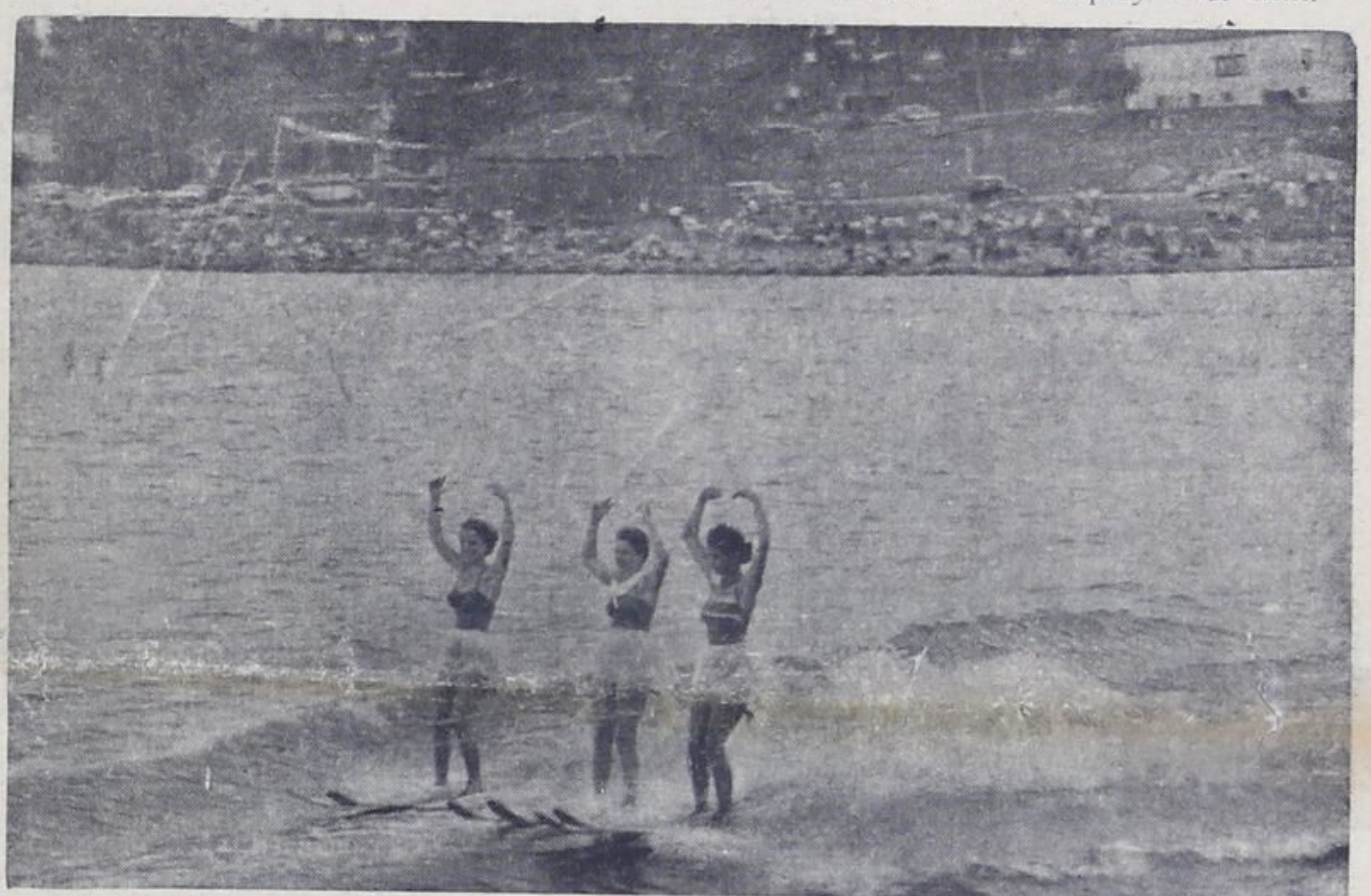
Rotary Carnival A Big Success

GAME LAWS OF 1955

There's a new game bird in Ontario this year for the hunter who desires a change. For the first time since 1917 the men behind the guns can try their luck with the morning dove, a bird found chiefly in the southern part of the province. The Canadian Wildlife Service, Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources, made this announcement today when publishing its 1955 hunting regulations for the province. These regulations show that the daily bag limit for this species will be eight birds.

Otherwise, there are few changes from last year, although the season in the central and southern hunting districts has been extended one day.

The bag limit for ducks remains at eight, not including mergansers nor more than one wood duck. Daily limits for other migratory game birds are five geese, twenty-five rails, coots and gallinules (in the aggregate), eight Wilson's snipe, eight woodcock, and eight mourning doves.

Sportsmen are advised to consult the Migratory Bird Regulations on the boundaries of the three districts into which Ontario is divided. Restrictions on shooting methods and weapons remain similar to those in 1954.

Open seasons have been announced as follows (all dates inclusive): Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Gallinules, Woodcock, Mourning Doves and Wilson's Snipe. In the Northern District, Sept. 15 to Dec. 15. In the Central District, Sept. 17 to Dec. 15. In the Southern District (except that in Essex County the open season for geese is from October 1 to December 31 inclusive), Oct. 1 to Dec. 15.

LCBO missed again Cars crash at corner

There was a loud crash and thirsty citizens went running, but they were disappointed. Two cars collided at the Main and Ferguson intersection Wednesday evening, but the cars missed the LCBO building.

The cars were driven by Kenneth Laronde, Second street, Haileybury, who was driving down the hill and by Conrad LaCasse, Ottawa, who was on Ferguson Avenue. Both cars were damaged, but the drivers were not injured. Police are investigating.

Crown Witness Shot No Foul Play - Police

Provincial police say that they have discounted the possibility of foul play in connection with the death of Leonard James Holdsworth of Coleman township.

Holdsworth was found dying inside his one-room shack last Friday, one hour before he was to appear in court as a crown witness in a criminal charge against two Cobalt men.

Police say that in a dying declaration, Holdsworth told them that he fell down a flight of steps into his basement, as he was cleaning a revolver. The gun discharged, and the bullet lodged in his brain.

Firemen Vote No Bucke Deal But Will Reconsider Tonight

Will they or won't they. No one seems to know whether Haileybury volunteer firemen will fight fires in Bucke township, and the firemen themselves haven't made up their minds.

Tuesday night the firemen held a special meeting, and voted seven to six against any agreement with Bucke. Then they changed their minds and decided to hold another meeting this evening and reconsider.

At the Tuesday evening meeting, many firemen felt that taking the time off to fight fires outside Haileybury might make it difficult for employees and employers alike.

Fire Chief Ken Watson pointed out that the agreement with Bucke would make a lot of extra work. Apart from needing another truck, the town would have to keep a second set of books, and there would have to be a proper system of fire inspection in Bucke township.

In the meantime, it is expected that Haileybury council may authorize the fire department to render emergency aid to Bucke until a decision is reached, or until Bucke gets its own fire brigade.
