**THE ROTARY WHEEL**

This week, our club was fortunate in listening to not only an interesting, but educational lecture on the Bell Telephone Micro-Wave system which is now being constructed from coast to coast.

A number of guests attended, Rotarian Jim Thomson of North Bay, Rotarian John Lonie of Eric, Ontario, Clarence Taylor of Toronto, and Mr. McKelvie of the Northern Telephone Company in New Liskeard.

The lecture was given by Don Black and Mr. Ryan, both of the Bell Telephone Company, who had set up miniature transmitting and receiving towers, which are seen along the highways between North Bay and Latchford.

A demonstration was given on the operation of these towers, how one tower will receive and then transmit these micro-waves on to the next tower. Conductors of electricity, such as aluminum of which planes are chiefly constructed, will break these waves. A special cable is also used, as demonstrated by Mr. Ryan. This cable has receiving and transmitting horns at each end, and can be knotted or twisted in its path from one tower, along the ground, to another tower, and can still operate without interference. Also used, in a new type of horn on the towers, is a special disc. Just as a magnifying glass is used to magnify objects, it was explained that this disc is used in the same manner to amplify these micro-waves.

Television can be transmitted through these towers, which is experienced in larger centres in Southern Ontario, by lines from the television control stations tapped right into the house just as a telephone.

What does this mean to Haileybury? The Bell Telephone Micro-Wave System only operates under the direction of television stations such as those being set up at North Bay and Timmins. These stations are closest to our district, but through tests made by Mr. McKelvie, we are just out of reach of being able to receive television from them, as television only travels 45 to 50 miles from the transmitting station.

Therefore the only way we will receive television is by freak reception, by a local station, or by a booster tower set up in this area with lines tapped into each home with a television set. But due to the high cost of television, it will be years before we, in this district will be able to enjoy television.

**TREE PLANTING**

Applicants who plan on tree planting projects next spring are urged by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests to file their applications as soon as possible, since applications are treated in priority according to the date received by the Reforestation Division.

Briefly, regulations provide that the owner of a parcel of land of at least two acres, exclusive of any area occupied by structures, may obtain nursery stock from the Department for establishing, replenishing or enlarging a wood or shelter belt. Charges are at the rate of \$14 per thousand for Scotch Pine and \$10 per thousand for other species. Applications must be made on forms obtainable from district or other Department offices.
