Prospectors at Toronto

The Prospectors and Developers Association executive states that the 24th. Annual meeting and Convention will be held at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto from March 4th to 7th, 1956.

The official opening buffet dinner and address, Sunday evening will be preceded by a Pre-convention Reception in the President's Penthouse, 25 Adelaide Street West, Toronto, at 3:00 p. m.

Scope of the proposed programme of lectures and panels will be broadened to cover more completely Canada's steadily expanding mineral resources. Topics to be covered will include nickel and copper, lead, zinc and silver asbestos, uranium and the deacidification of uranium ores, iron, lithium, petroleum and natural gas as well as pipe line developments.

Canada's technical advancement in atomic reactors will be discussed by Dr. David A. Keys, Scientific Adviser to the President of "Nuclear Energy - Our Future Source of Power".

Top-ranking authorities in lithium from the viewpoint of concentration and chemical treatment will cover this subject fully in panel discussion as will a panel discuss the practicability of refining low-grade uranium ores by deacidification process.

Association members and guests will be presented the latest facts and figures on newly producing uranium and copper ore bodies and will hear up-to-date fact findings of Ottawa's geologists and scientists of Canada's outlying and little prospected regions.

Authorities on United States and Canadian iron ore development and processing will conduct a panel discussion as a measure of enlightenment in this industry which is steadily gaining prominence in Canada's dollar value of mineral production.

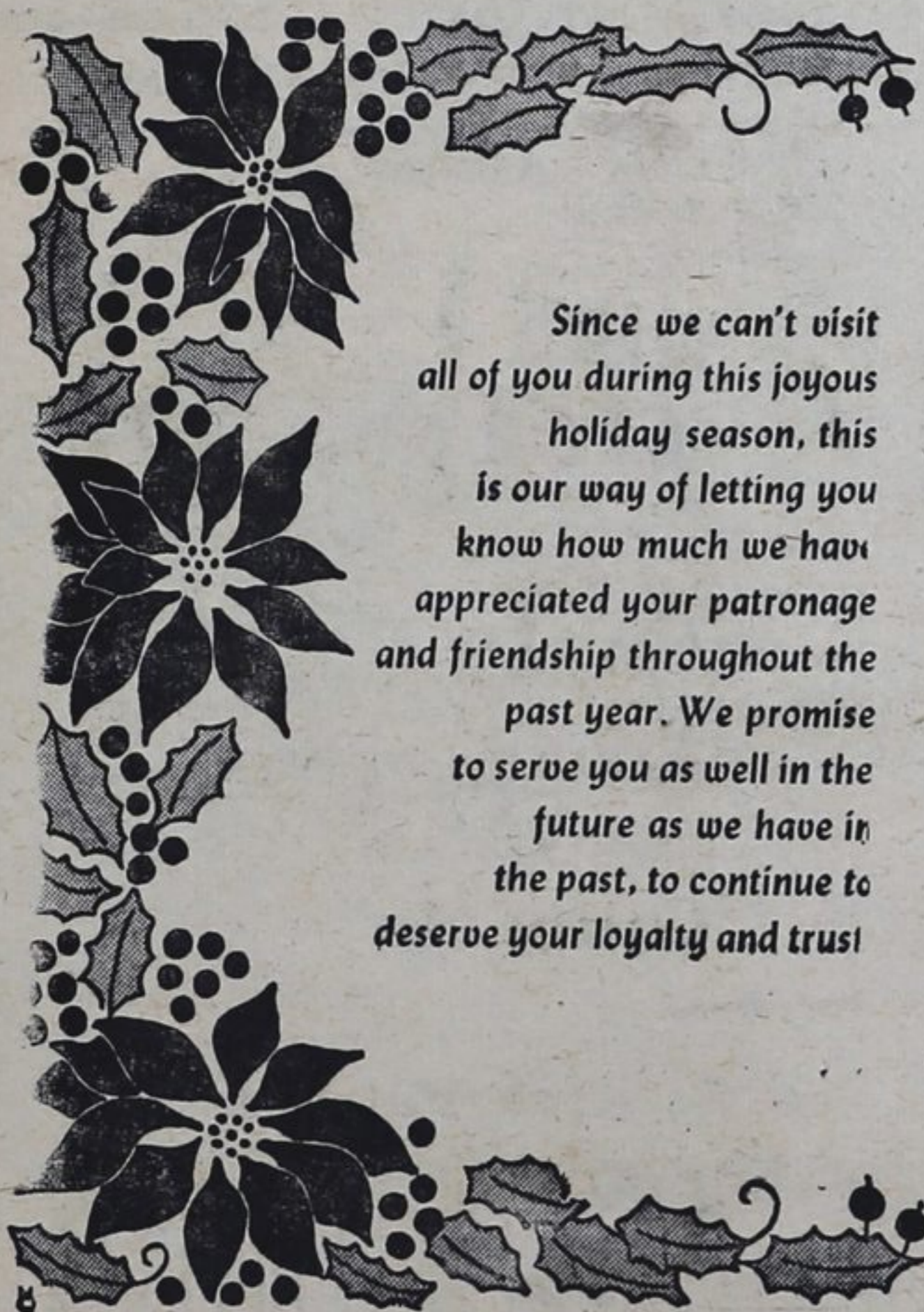
