Pioneer Recalls Town's Early Days

A man who has a wealth of memories of the growth of Haileybury is Thomas Lemon, who has been operating the town pumps for forty-five years.

In 1900 he came from Toronto bringing his wife and baby son, Roy and has called Haileybury his home ever since it's inauguration.

During the first few years in the north, he worked as captain on the steamer owned by Mr. Hammond, the "Little Roxie", then when the railway was being built, he drove a team for A. J. Murphy, who was contracting for the T. and N.O.

In 1909 he started working for the town, in the fire department, then two years later, Neil McAulay, Sr., started him on the job of operating the town pumps and that position he is still filling efficiently.
