## Hold Cocktail Vote To Save Cobalt's Money

The Cobalt council has decided to put cocktails on the ballots when the town goes to the polls on December 2. The council met Tuesday, and unaimously agreed that it would be in the town's interest to put the cocktail question to the people on December 2.

The council was motivated by two considerations. The first being the proposed by-pass, which will put Cobalt some four miles away from the main highway. It was felt that cocktail bars might be a means of attracting tourists and business from neighboring towns.

The second was one of economy. By putting the cocktail question on the ballot at the municipal election, the town can save a good deal of money. If the hotel interests ask for a vote later in the year, the council will have to appoint special returning officers, publish proclamations, and indulge in other expenses. This way the cost of holding the vote will be little more than a regular municipal election.

Conrad Lavigne's CFCL-TV station at Timmins has been granted permission by the CBC to erect a Satellite at Elk Lake according to reports from Ottawa. A CBC recommendation will go to the federal minister of transport, who will have the last word.

Mr. Lavigne was granted the permission over the strenuous opposition of the Roy Thomson-controlled CJKL at Kirkland Lake. The victory for Mr. Lavigne represents the first serious defeat the Thomson Company has taken in this part of Northern Ontario for many years.
