"CRAB FANCY" GOES TO A PARTY



It's party time . . . yes a summer luncheon party. What to serve? Why not cool refreshing Crab Fancy? Sure to please all hot-weather wilted appetites.

It's easy to prepare and something that can be done long before your guests arrive. Crab Fancy is canned condensed consomme, well chilled in the can, just broken up with a fork into which you fold chunks of canned crabmeat. A combination so delicious.

Add extra attraction to this simple delicacy. Lemon slices with crisp watercress bouquets give that final touch. Vary the recipe from party to party, all summer long. Substitute lobster or shrimp for the crab, next time.

For a nice accompaniment, pass a tray of fancy sandwiches. Fresh peach shortcake topped with whipped cream and tall glasses of iced coffee complete this party luncheon. You'll be delighted with the compliments you receive.

You will be that charming hostess if you try this recipe:

CRAB FANCY (CONSUMME)

- 2 cans (10 ounces each) condensed consomme
- 1 cup flaked cooked crab (6 1/2 ounce can)
- Lemon slices
- Watercress

Chill consomme until set (about 4 hours in refrigerator). Put through ricer or break up with fork. Fold in crab. Makes 4 to 5 servings. Serve with lemon slices and watercress.

SOUP SCOOPS

CHILL THIS ASPARAGUS-CHICKEN SOUP

Suit this soup to summer by chilling it. Try this combination of condensed soups for chilling: 1 can condensed cream of asparagus soup with 2 cans cream of chicken soup and 3 soup cans milk. Blend well. Chill 4 hours. Serve in icy bowls. 8 servings.

Have a sense of responsibility and should like children and preferably live in the neighborhood.

2. Instructions should be given in writing as well as orally—Where you are going and telephone number, or the name and number of someone to call in an emergency.

Your telephone number and location of telephone.

Emergency telephone numbers for Fire, Police, Doctor.

How to call the fire department.

Location of exits.

How to control the furnace or stove.

Leave a flashlight in case of power failure.

3. Guide to the sitter in emergency:

Get the children safely out.

Even if it's cold, don't wait to dress them. Wrap them in a blanket.

Even the smell of smoke or gas is enough warning to call the fire department, or summon help. Be sure to say exactly where you are. If you can, turn on the front lights to attract attention.

Don't ever re-enter the house. Smoke or gas from a very small fire may be fatal.

If you are trapped inside, remember that the air near the floor is usually better in a smoke-filled room.

Inside, don't turn on or off any electric switches. This may cre-

ate a spark, ignite gas vapors and cause explosion.

Your local Fire Chief may have a printed guide on the subject of child protection. If you do a fair amount of baby sitting, get a copy. He'll be delighted to hear that you mean business and, like him, are deeply concerned with the welfare of your charges.

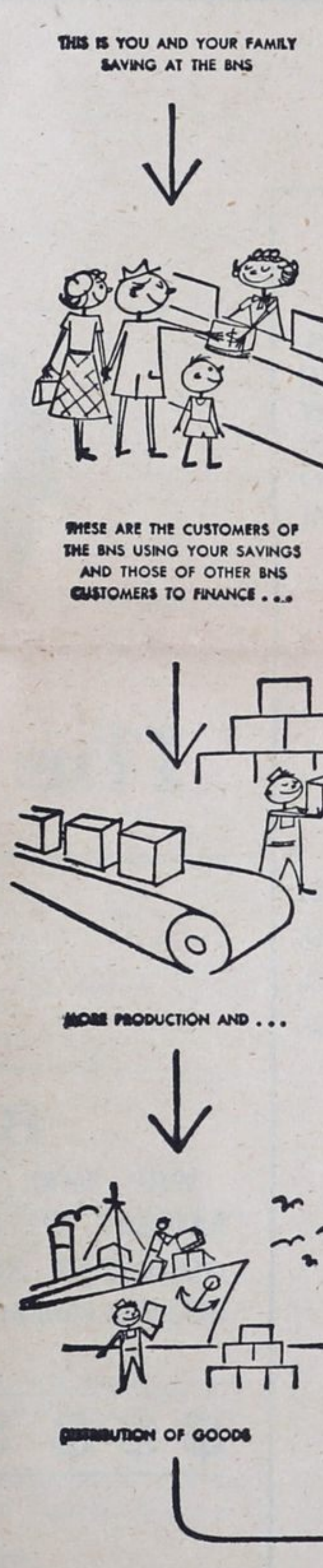
