

Firemen Answer Call Sunday Night

A Haileybury house was seriously damaged by fire Sunday night and an empty farm house at Mileage 104 was destroyed in another blaze.

Fire Chief Ken Watson of Haileybury said he believed the fire in the residence of Jim Rose, on the Lakeshore Road, had been burning for six to eight hours, before the fire department was called.

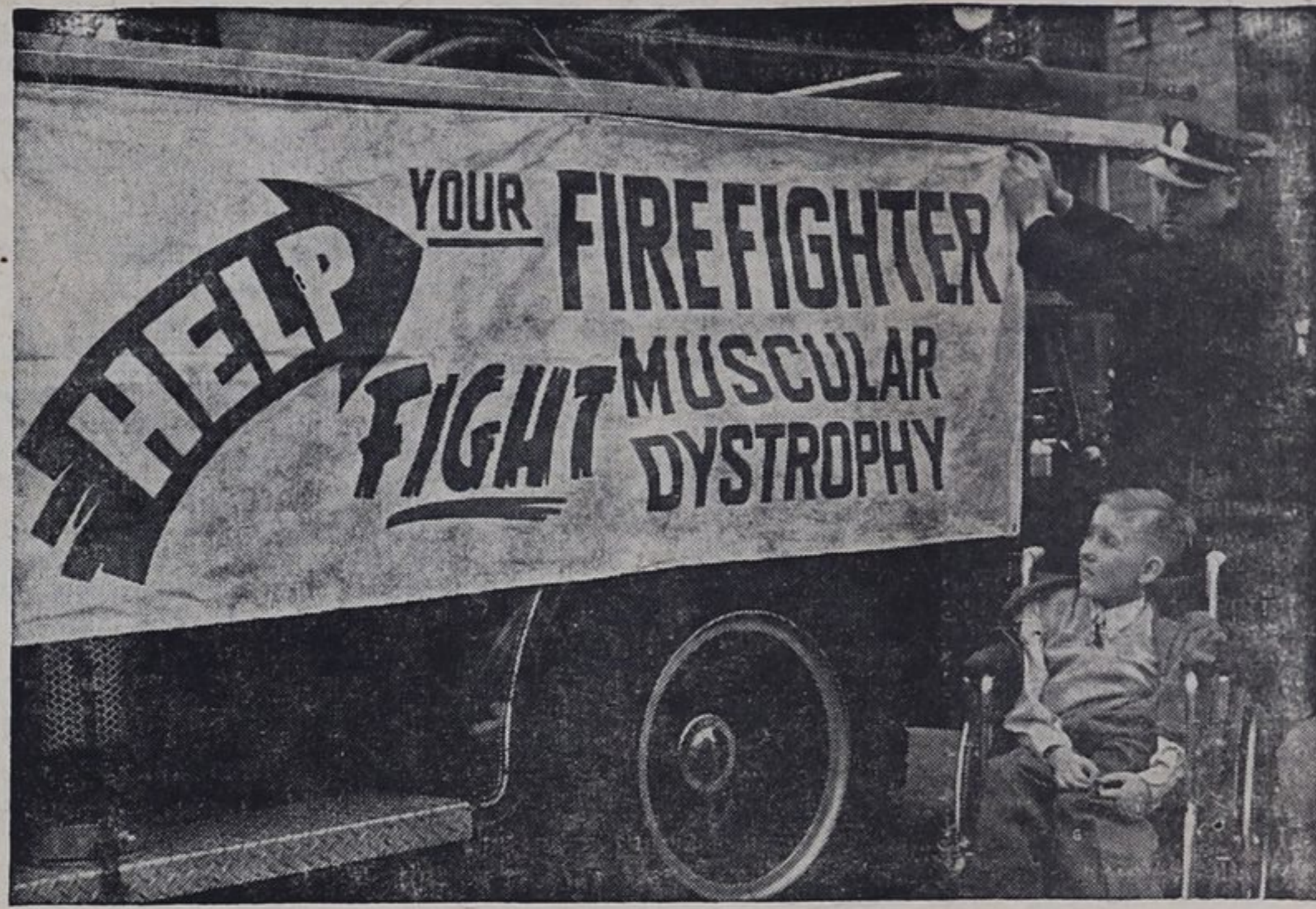
A passing motorist turned in the alarm. The Haileybury volunteers fought the fire for more than three hours.

Fire Chief Watson said the fire started when the flue door of an oil furnace flew out. The fire worked its way through the walls and up into the attic.

The entire residence suffered severe smoke, water and heat damage.

About the same time, Cobalt volunteers were called to the ski club road at Mileage 104 to fight a fire that broke out in an empty house, once occupied by Z. Larabie.

The blaze lit up the countryside and attracted many spectators, as the farm house was in an area where there are many mine and mill buildings.

T.V. Reception To Be Christmas Gift Says Chartrand

Tuesday in conversation with George A. Chartrand, manager of CKRN-TV, who was in Haileybury while enroute to North Bay, it was learned that erection of the 670' steel tower of CKRN-TV had been started Saturday November 16th, by Lackie Bros., of Toronto. Monday night 118' feet of steel had been erected and they should reach the 300' foot level by this week-end, weather permitting.

The smartly-finished brick building has been completed on the outside and sub-contractors are working inside, they include heating, plumbing, ventilation, and electrical.

Mr. Chartrand stated that the Rouyn-Noranda Electrical Co-op., started construction of the sub-station. It was announced last Thursday that Premier Maurice Duplessis had approved the request of Northern Radio for 60 cycle power.

Delivery of the transmitter is expected before November 22, and completion of the installation will be around December 10th.

D. A. Gour, president of Nor-

thern Radio Inc., owners of CKRN-TV said that there is a possibility that CKRN-TV will be in operation sometime in December.
