The attendance at the meeting was much larger than usual.

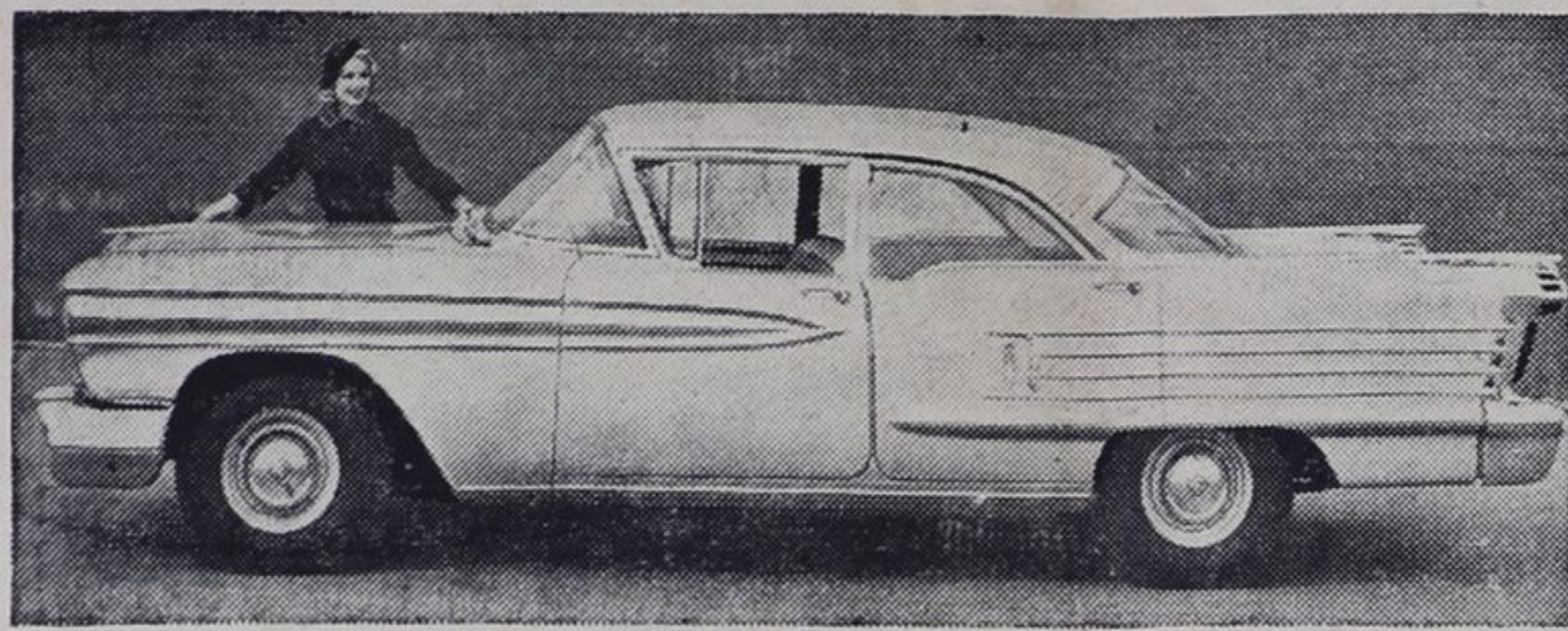
UNITED CHURCH FEDERATION MEETING
