Tory Statement Resented By Local 229 O.F.U.

The executive of Local 229 of the Ontario Farmers' Union met at Hudson township near New Liskeard to protest action taken by the Conservative Campaign Committee on a joint political rally on farm issues. "We are deeply resentful of certain statements made by the Conservatives in connection with a proposed joint meeting with a president to arrange," said Art Ship, president of the local. Mr. Ship said his group was surprised to hear an announcement made by Tories that they are inviting Liberal and CCF candidates to appear at a public meeting. "In view of the recent meeting of the committee to let C. Foster Rice appear at a similar meeting sponsored by the OFU, it would appear their objections are not to meeting other candidates but to the fact the union wanted to sponsor the meeting," Mr. Ship said. He said the Conservatives stated they wanted to sponsor the meeting in order to "make certain it would be fair to all concerned and not turn out like it did last year as a political circus."
