These are nasty insinuations which the union doesn't like, "Mr. Ship asserted." "Particularly when the Tories say the chairman should be neutral and keep the meeting under control."

Mr. Ship said the statement that the committee "expected to have a constructive meeting like the people wanted," was uncalled for. "I can only interpret this as a direct insult to myself as chairman and to the entire membership of the union," he said.

"The statement that the CCF put pressure on us to hold the meeting is entirely false," he added. "Sponsoring meeting of the type is a regular activity of the union and is done all across the province."

"We deeply regret that a political party which at one time enjoyed the confidence and support of some of our members, should make this unjustified attack upon the integrity of the organized farmers of Timiskaming," Mr. Ship concluded.
