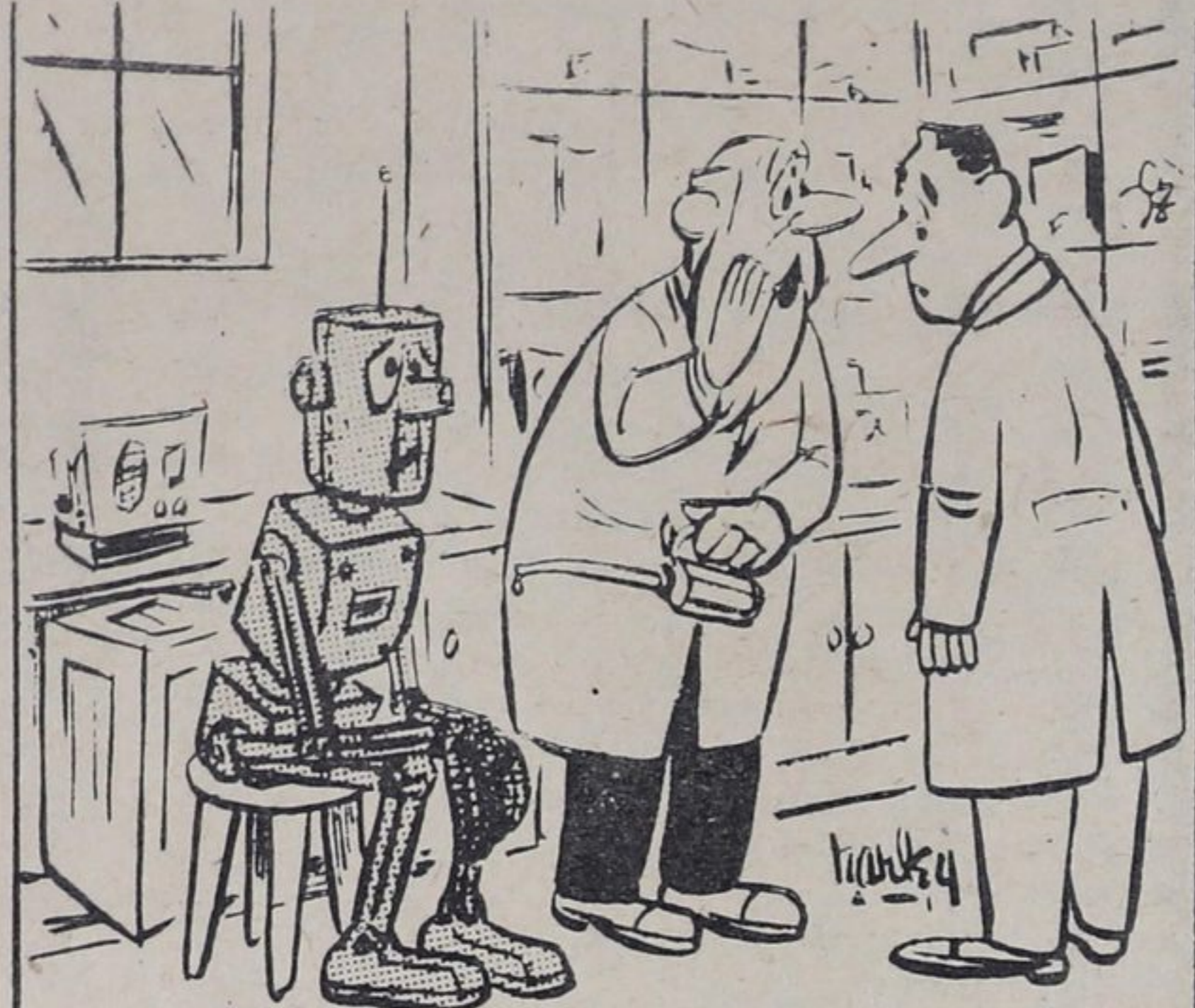


### COBALT LEGION LADIES

**BAILED OUT AT 650 MPH**—Despite his broken bones, test pilot Leo J. Colapietro, 34, manages to smile from his hospital bed. Colapietro cracked two vertebrae, dislocated his shoulder, fractured his pelvis, and broke his right arm in two places when he bailed out of his uncontrollable Douglas F4-D Skyray that was traveling at a speed of 650 mph. Colapietro landed in the Pacific and was picked up about 45 minutes later by a life-guard launch.
