SHAKE-UP AT THE JAIL

FOUR TRANSFERRED 18 HIRED AND FIRED AT LOCAL JAIL

The department of reform institutions, which has hired four jail governors at Haileybury in the past five years, has now transferred three guards and a matron, all with years of service, and who own their homes in the community.

The Haileyburian has learned from reliable sources that Reg. Tombs, who has 35 years services and owns a home in town, will be sent to Monteith. G. M. MacDonnell, ten years service, has been transferred. M. Hurteau, seven years service, has been ordered to Burwash. Mrs. A. T. Humphrey, matron with 14 years service has been ordered to Mercer reformatory. A Svekers, temporary guard from Cobalt with some six months service has been fired.

The order for transferring the jail employees were handed out Wednesday, and followed a hush-hush board of enquiry held some six weeks ago.

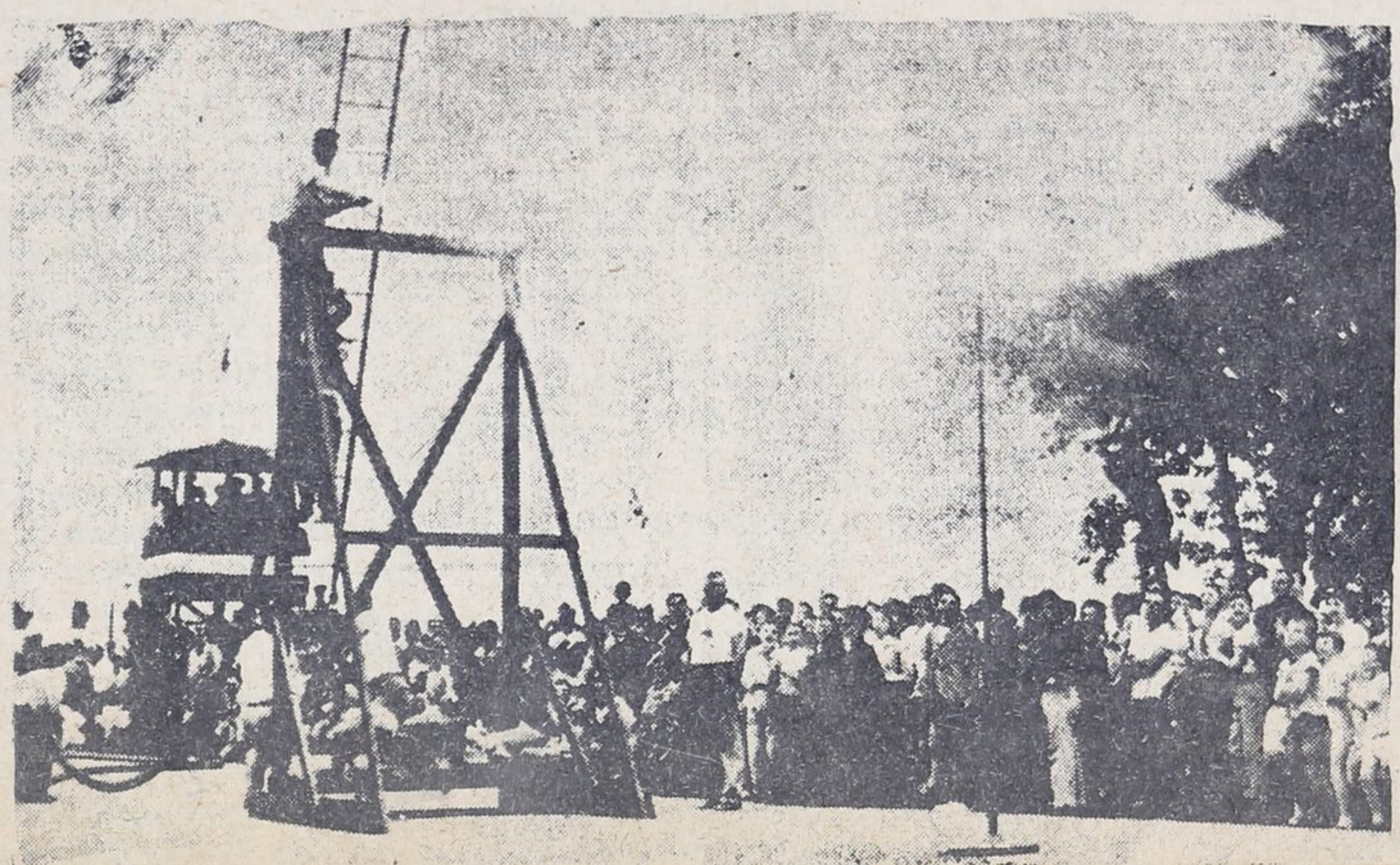
Mrs. Humphrey is a widow Her husband who died late in 1952, was governor for fourteen years. She has a teenage daughter to support.

The Haileyburian has also learned that during the past year, some 18 guards have been replaced at the provincial jail. Early this year the jail was removed completely from the jurisdiction of the sheriff and the local governor is given virtually a free hand in hiring help.
