ALL DRY WEST OF TRACK

Residents west of the tracks in Haileybury are without water as the result of low water levels at Constance Lake. The lake is the town's emergency reservoir, used only when the down-town pump house breaks down, but it is used to supply the residents west of the track by a gravity feed.

Charles Camsell, chairman of the water committee said that the situation is serious, as the whole town will be without water if should be a hydrobreakdown. The town's gasoline pump is being overhauled, and if the hydro fails, it will be impossible to get water from Constance.

The town is sending two men to make a survey of Constance to try and determine what the water resources are, and if they could be improved. Mr. Camsell said that it may be a coincidence but the water

a coincidence, but the water levels at Constance have been falling ever since there was diamond drilling done there a few years ago.
