July were cool but not as cool-as it was away in 1904 when the temperature dropped to 35.8.

For July, 1958, the ave-

rage mean temperature was 68.0, for the same period in 1957 it was 69.7 and the average since 1894 is 66.8.

The maximum temperature for this July was 90.0 on the 22nd. two degrees higher than it was in 1957 and much lower than the average since 1894 when 102.0 was registered in 1921.

The minimum for both this year and last year was exactly the same, at 49 degrees as compared to 35.8 as the average since 1894.
