Cobalt lost one of its oldest, most respected and well-known citizens, Patrick James Hassett who died suddenly at his home 13 1/2 Cobalt Street, on Sunday morning, August 17, aged 79 years.

He had been in failing health since the 1st. of July.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Hassett and was born in Ennis, County Clare, Ireland. He lived in Espanola and Sudbury and came to Cobalt in 1907. He had been retired for a quite a few years after operation a taxi business and later a grocery business. He married the former Miss Mary O'Gorman in 1927.

Mr. Hassett was a member of long standing in the Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society, and the Kiwanis Club.

Funeral services were held in St. Patrick's Church at 10 a. m. with Rev. Father

Burial was in the R.C. Cemetery, Haileybury.
