New Liskeard.

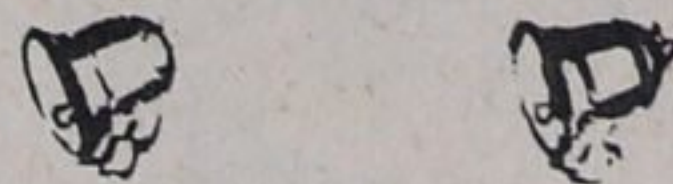

The greatest problem people have to face today is keeping their ambitions pinned down to their salaries.



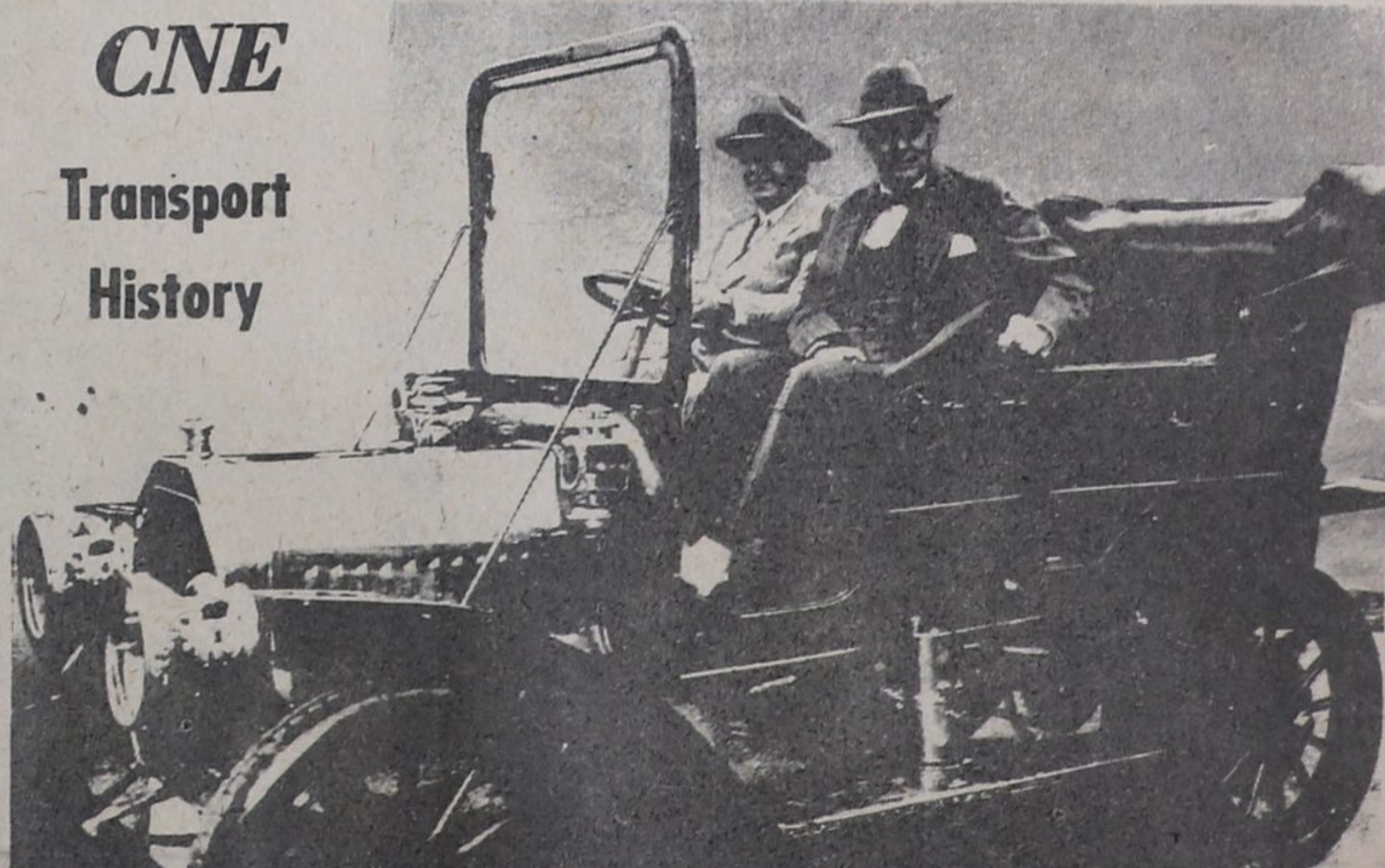
The Roger Dee hit parade
