We want to thank a great many people who have helped during the past three years. First of all the North Bay Nugget, which kept us on at full salary so that we could afford to run the Haileyburian. Following a motor accident, we have found it more and more difficult to do two jobs, and this too has contributed toward our decision to sell. However the Nugget's assistance is a rare example of a large daily materially assisting a small and struggling weekly.

We must also thank Alan Hurst at the Bank of Nova Scotia, who never yelled too loud when we got in the red and always provided a good deal of sound advice.

Brigadier G. L. Cassidy will be in North Bay this week end to attend the Change of Command Parade when he will retire after 20 years service.

Enlisting in the Algonquin Regiment in March of 1939, he was commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant that year and qualified as Lieutenant in the summer of 1940. He went with the unit when it was mobilized as Carrier Platoon Commander.

In 1942 he was promoted to the rank of Captain and Company Commander. In 1943 he was promoted, in England, to Major. He served with the Algonquins throughout the NW Europe Campaign, and was wounded in September, 1944, in Belgium.

He acted as second - incommand of the Regiment for a time and twice commanded the battalion in action, in Normandy and the Rhineland.

He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order in the spring of 1945. Following his return to Canada he served one year as Army Counsallor in the discharge services, then returned to teach again in Cobalt.

Appointed second-incommand of the post-war battalion in 1946, he was promoted to Lieut-Colonel to command the Algonquins in 1950. In October, 1954, he was promoted Colonel to command the newlyformed 16 Militia Group composed of Northern Outario and some Southern

Taking over the position formerly held by Brigadier Cassidy will be Colonel J. H. Westhead of Toronto.
